REPORT THAT BELGIAN

PRINCE WAS WOUNDED BY ZEPPELIN BOMB

New York, Nov. 3.—Word has just been received that Prince Leopold, heir to the Belgian throne, who is now at Eton, was in London on the evening of the big Zeppelin raid and was slightly injured.

The prince and another Belgian boy who is at Eton, went to London on the night of the raid, intending to spend three days. They were to be the guests of Count Delbeke, a member of the Belgian Royal household, now resident in London.

The count's valet met the prince and his friend at Paddington Station on their arrival from Eton in the evening. The boys went with the valet to dine at a restaurant, intending later to go to a moving picture theatre. As they came out of the restaurant the first bomb began to fall. One exploded within about sixty yards of the party.

Prince Leopold was knocked down by the force of the explosion and his arm was cut by a piece of the bomb. The valet and the other boy escaped unhurt.

MORNING NEWS OF CANADA AT WAR

Local Recruiting Meetings and Recruits—Casualties in the 26th—Officers Must be Competent—Letters From the Firing Line

A large gathering assembled last night in Temperance Hall, St. James street, for a recruiting meeting at which the speakers were Rev. M. E. Fletcher and Sgt. Knight. A. M. Belding presided, and A. W. Baird and W. Brindle took part in the programme. Much interest was shown in the speeches. Another meeting is to be held tonight in St. Michael's Hall, North End.

Recruits.

Casualties.
The casualty list yesterday included the name of Pte. George Secie, of Brant, killed in action with the 26th Battalion, and Cyprus Allan, of Port Elgin, 26th Battalion, wounded but returned to duty. Robert McEwan, Sydney, N. S., 16th Battalion, is reported wounded; Edgar Wood, Chignecto, N. S., 22d Battalion, seriously ill; James Cann, Glace Bay, N. S., 25th Battalion, killed in action, and Chas. McDonald, Glace Bay, N. S., 25th Battalion, returned to duty after having been wounded.

Must Be Qualified.
Sir Sam Hughes in Ottawa yesterday said that there must be no doubt as to Canadian officers' qualifications—every one who went overseas must be fit for the job, and two battalions are being held now from going across until their officers qualify or are replaced.

Rev. M. E. Connon has been transferred to the 104th from the 64th battalion. Soldiers' Letters.

A letter received from Pte. Jack D. Cameron of the 26th, formerly of Le-preaux, tells of his having come through the heavy fighting of early October safely.

Mrs. South has received a letter written by her husband, Pte. George South, a few days before Oct. 18, in which he said that "though fighting had been severe, he had come through safely and hoped to return home unharmed." A few days later he fell, mortally wounded.

In a letter from Pte. J. A. McDonald, chaplain with the Field Ambulance, 2d Division, he tells of ministering to the wounded in hospital and of general conditions along the firing line.

MORE CHARGES AGAINST THE CITY CONSTABLES

Sir Edward Grey announced in the British House of Commons yesterday that Great Britain is prepared to recognize the Carranza government in Mexico.

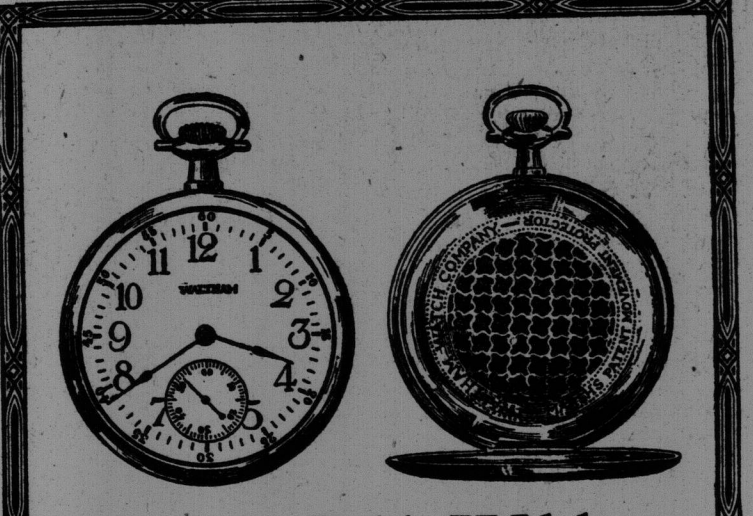
800 CANADIANS LEAVE ENGLAND ON WAY HOME
