IMPERIAL HIT IN MR. BARNES OF NEW YORK

Crowded Houses, in Spite of Weather, Enjoy Great Picture—New Vaudeville Very Humorous Act

Although it rained the proverbial pitchforks last night, usual crowds attended Imperial Theatre, attracted no doubt by the fine bill of fare provided. "Mr. Barnes of New York" as a novel, was the best seller of the early nineties being a story of A. Clavering Gunter's, dealing with the adventures of a rich American in an international tangle in which Italy, England and Arabia were involved. Maurice Costello, eminent Vitaphone star, played the leading role, but quite as prominent as he were other favorites—Donald Hall, Darwin Karr, Charles Kent and others. Mary Christensen, Naomi Gaidler and other of Vitaphone's best-known actresses, played the prominent opposite parts.

Possibly no story screened at the Imperial of late months contained as much real story value as "Mr. Barnes of New York", and it could be readily seen that six reels of film were necessary to convey the plot intelligently to the onlooker. The story started with a quarrel between a British and an Italian naval officer, the swearing of a vendetta upon the Englishman and the following up of that direful pledge gave the author his cue for a most intense drama. Notable among the scenes in this film were Ajaccio, Corsican metropolis; bombardment of Alexandria; Partisan views; scenes in London and at Monte Carlo. No detail was spared in telling the story exhaustively, and it was a real dramatic treat from start to finish.

The Imperial introduced still another novelty this week in Hodge & Lovell, a vaudeville duo whose work is along eccentric lines, if not grotesque. He plays a rube lover and she an ultra-fashionable old maid, the combination being extremely funny and quite different from anything shown in the Keith house for some time. As usual the orchestra "cued" the big picture with interpretive numbers that made it doubly interesting.

On Wednesday and Thursday Edward Ahlbes, noted American star, will be seen in another Broadway success entitled "The Million." This is classed as a melo-dramatic farce with tangles and intrigues so carefully intermingled that the audience is in varying moods every scene. For the week-end the new serial story, "The Black Box," will have its opening chapter.


