BISHOP LeBLANC CONFIRMS 161 IN THE CATHEDRAL

In the Cathedral this morning the Sacrament of Confirmation was administered to 161 by His Lordship Bishop LeBlanc. The ceremony followed mass celebrated at 7 o'clock by His Lordship, assisted by Rev. M. P. Howland, Rev. Dr. Bourgeois, Rev. Hector Belliveau, and Rev. Wm. Duke, rector. After mass the candidates received Holy Communion, following which they were conformed. Bishop LeBlanc delivered an inspiring address to them upon the Sacrament, giving them much good practical advice, and also taking their pledges of temperance.
The class confirmed was divided among Holy Trinity, St. John the Baptist and the Cathedral parishes, and was made up as follows—Cathedral, girls, sixty; boys forty-one, adults eleven; Holy Trinity, girls fifteen, boys thirteen, adults three; St. John the Baptist, girls eleven, boys six, adults one.

WINDOW BOX IDEA IS TAKING HOLD

Further Suggestions in Reference to This Plan For Beautifying of City
The suggestion, made in The Times last week, that the appearance of the city would be greatly benefited by the use of window boxes of flowers to brighten up the streets, has been received with marked approval. The idea has been recognized as a good one but what is needed is some individual or firm of sufficient initiative and sufficient prominence to show what can be done along this line.
The suggestion emanated from N. C. Cameron, secretary of the Retail Merchants' Association, and since then Mr. Cameron has received many inquiries as to where such boxes could be secured. The inquiries have been answered by proposals which have been made to the association by local firms to furnish standardized window boxes, neatly painted, filled with earth and with flowers already planted, at \$1 each. A sample set contained good sized geraniums already in bloom and dwarf nasturtiums which would soon be in flower.
At this rate the amount of money involved would be very small compared with the difference that a liberal display of growing flowers would make in the appearance of the city. Another suggestion, which would make the cost even lower, has been made by an interested party, who suggests that a florist or gardener could develop a profitable annual business by supplying boxes free of charge for the privilege of filling them with flowers, at reasonable cost, each spring.
Halifax has now taken up the window box plan and it is being urged daily in the newspapers of the city. St. John seldom allows Halifax to show more enterprise in any matter than this city.

C. P. R. SECURES NEW RUSSIAN PRIVILEGES

London, June 12.—The official announcement is made from Petrograd that the Russian government has entered into an exclusive agreement with the C. P. R. which provides for a through goods service with North America via the Trans-Siberian Railway and Vladivostok. This is explained at the offices here to be an extension to the freight service of the special privileges granted with regard to passenger traffic two years ago, whereby travelling was rendered much more convenient. It will doubtless be a set-off against the loss of the privileges in Austria, including that of operating C. P. R. observation cars over the state railways, against which it is now known, strong German influences were brought to bear two years ago.
