Says Injections of Pure Cow's Milk Will Arrest Failure of Eyesight

Toronto, Aug. 12-A Mail and Empire special from New York says that failing sight, the result of rheumatic or other infection, or even the penetration of the eyeball, can be arrested within the three days by injections of pure cow's milk into the lumbar region of the patient, according to Dr. Edward R. Goodin of Boston, who arrived here after five months' study in Vienna of this new discovery by physicians of the hospital attached to the University of Vienna.

Dr. Goodin denied early reports that the milk injections are a cure for blindness. Those who are already blind, he said, may not hope for the restoration of their sight by this method but those who are but partially blind from infection or penetration, or those in whose eyes the infection has just been discovered, have good reasons to hope that their sight will get no worse, and also that sympathetic ophthmalia (affection of the other eye) will be prevented.

London, Aug. 12. — The French and Belgians will not withdraw their troops from the Ruhr this year and probably not until next summer, according to decisions reached at direct pour parlers between Premier Herriot and the German delegation. Well informed observers expect word as to the date of evacuation by tonight.

A final protocol incorporating all agreements reached at the conference may be signed Friday. Meanwhile the Germans have begun to put out feelers to establish contact with the Anglo-American banking group regard-ing underwriting the \$200,000,-

000 proposed loan. The council of the "Big Fourteen" approved the reports of the various committees, with only a few comparatively minor reservations.

When the French and Belgians got together on the subject of military evacuation of the occupied areas, the former proposed two years as a limit within which withdrawal would be completed.




