London, Nov. 30. — (By Canadian Press.)—Gold bullion to the value of be-tween £5,000,000 and £6,000,0000 has been recovered from the sunken steam-ship Laurentic, off the Irish coast, and there is still much more of the precious metal to be salvaged. She was sunk by the Germans in January, 1917, off one of the wildest parts of the north coast of Ireland and has been at the bottom of the sea since. The Laurentic could not be lifted, but the gold she was carrying at the fime of the disaster was too valuable to be left in "Davy Jones' locker," so expert divers were set to work to lift the gold. 

The U. S. public will pay \$80,000,-000 less to travel on the country's rail-roads in 1922 than they paid this year. This saving is to accure to the public as a result of the repeal of the trans-portation tax of 8 per cent on passen-ger rates enacted into law in the form of the new Internal Revenue Tax bill which was signed by President Harding on last Wednesday night. The railroad provisions of the bill go into effect on Jan. 1 next. The tax on freight rates was 3 per cent. The transportation tax, which has been in effect since early in 1918, has netted the government approximately \$360,000,-000 annually, and its repeal simply means a reduction of 8 per cent. in pas scenaer rates and 3 per cent. in freight rates for the patrons of every railroad.
