London, March 81-In the House of Commons on Tuesday, the Secretary for War, Rt. Hon. Sir Laming Worthington-Evans, declined to make public the balance sheet of the Expeditionary Force canteens. Lord Wolmer, Coalition-Unionist, M.P., for Aldershot, asked why the War Secretary wished to conceal the facts.
