Chicago, Sept. 25—There was liquidation in wheat today and prices broke sharply with March leading. Buying by houses with eastern connections helped December. A big general trade was in evidence. Opening quotations, which ranged from 11-2 to 11-4 lower, with December \$2.22 to \$2.28 1-2, and March \$2.21, were followed by a moderate rally.

Trade in corn was only fair, with deferred deliveries at a new low mark. After starting 8-8 to three cents lower, with December 96 3-4 to 97, further declines took place and were followed by a reaction which carried prices back to the initial quotations.

Oats were firmer after an early break, but again became weak with other grains. Initial quotations were 1-8 to 8-4 cent lower, with December 57 1-18 to 57 1-4.
