NOVA SCOTIA APPLE CROP. Halifax Chronicle—The official estimate of the apple crop of Nova Scotia continues at 900,000 barrels, as compared with 1,500,000 last year, of which 475,000 were exported to the United Kingdom and 154,896 to the United States.

A big general trade was in evidence. Opening quotations, which ranged from 1-1/2 to 1-1/4 lower, with December 82-1/2 to 82-1/4, and March 82-1/2, were followed by a moderate rally.

Trade in corn was only fair, with deferred deliveries at a new low mark. After starting 8-8 to three cents lower with December 96-3/4 to 97, further declines took place and were followed by a reaction which carried prices back to the initial quotations.

Oats were firmer after an early break, but again became weak with other grains. Initial quotations were 1-8 to 3-4 cent lower with December 87-1/4 to 87-1/4. Provisions were quiet and weak.
