### PLAYERS MUST SECURE CARDS

Ontario Branch of A. A. U.  
of C. Assists in Promoting  
School Athletics.

(Toronto Globe.)  
Beginning with first of the year 1921  
all players competing in amateur sport  
of any kind must hold an amateur card.  
This is the decision arrived at by the  
delegates at the eleventh annual meet-  
ing of the Ontario Branch of the A. A.  
U. of C.

Many of the large organizations, such  
as the O. H. A., O. B. A., O. A. L.,  
A. O. B. F. U., O. A. B. A. and others,  
have already placed this matter before  
their executives, and at the commence-  
ment of their playing season will de-  
mand that before issuing a certificate to  
any player he must first secure his  
amateur card. This will place the mat-  
ter of deciding the amateur status of  
any player with the union, and will also  
provide a central system of registration  
of all competitors in amateur sport of  
any kind.

The question of issuing amateur cards  
to hockey players who competed with  
and against the professionals who were  
whitewashed by the Alberta Branch of  
the Union last winter will be referred  
to the Canadian Amateur Hockey Asso-  
ciation, and also debated at the annual  
meeting of the Amateur Athletic Union  
of Canada, which it is expected will be  
held in Winnipeg early in December.

Three Rounds Only.  
In connection with an application re-  
ceived to hold six-round amateur box-  
ing bouts it was pointed out that the  
constitution only provided for three  
rounds, with an extra round in cases of  
no decision by the judges.

A motion was carried that a commit-  
tee composed of a representative from  
each branch of sport be appointed to  
organize and assist in the promotion of  
athletics in colleges and schools in  
the outlying communities throughout the  
Province. This committee will be ap-  
pointed by the President and will meet  
together shortly in order to plan activi-  
ties for the coming season. It was  
pointed out that the future champion  
athletes must of necessity be found at  
the present time as youngsters attending  
these colleges and schools.

A meeting of the representatives of all  
industrial associations which have been  
recently accepted into membership will  
be held in the near future, with a view  
of obtaining more co-operation between  
such associations and the Union, so that  
there may be no misuse made of the ad-  
vantage which industrial organizations  
have by the offering of positions to men  
for their athletic prowess only.

Mr. Louis Rubenstein of the Quebec  
Branch of the A. A. U. of C. and Presi-  
dent of the Canadian Skating Associa-  
tion, addressed the meeting, and re-  
quested that the Ontario Branch take  
over the control of skating in this Pro-  
vince, so far as the issuing of cards  
and sanctions are concerned. This re-  
quest was referred to the incoming ex-  
ecutive.

**PAINTED THE HORSE  
AND WON THE RACES.**  
London, Oct. 20.—The Central Criminal Court here has been engaged in the  
investigation of five charges of turf con-  
spiracy and fraud involving tales of rac-  
ing tricks the like of which it would  
have taxed the brain of the most imagi-  
native of sporting novelists to conceive.  
All the charges rested more or less upon  
the substitution of one horse for another  
either in running or in market  
deals, but one was invested with in-  
genious and daring of a very special  
kind.

Briefly it necessitated the painting of  
a well-known horse to represent one  
which had no existence except as de-  
scribed on an entry form for a certain  
race. The conspirators were resource-  
ful enough to do it, although it meant the  
transmogrification of a good bay mare  
with several distinctive marks to fill the  
description of a brown crock supposed  
to have been bought out of the army  
for nineteen guineas. Thus faked the  
mare ran, and, of course, won, bringing  
profits to those interested in her to the  
extent of several thousands of pounds.  
After the race petrol and peroxide served  
to restore the mare to her former state.  
In the meantime, however, another small  
difficulty had been got over—namely,  
the buying in of the mare at a consider-  
able price—it was selling a race she won  
—for, of course, her connections had in  
order to keep their secret to see that  
she did not pass into other hands. With  
the ownership of the animal unchanged,  
there appeared to be every likelihood of  
the fraud passing undiscovered. So it  
did for some time. Indeed it might have  
remained buried but for the indifference  
of one of the parties to it in another  
matter, and the fact that so many people  
were necessarily in the secret as to  
render a disclosure almost inevitable once  
suspicion was aroused.

When laid on the trail the detectives  
quickly exposed a series of nefarious  
transactions which had been inspired by  
a man against whom there were already  
convictions for fraud. This person, who  
was passing under the description of a  
gentleman rider, was now sent to prison  
for three years.

**Ruth's Walks Set Record.**  
Chalk up another record to the credit  
of Babe Ruth. According to statistics  
compiled by Ernest J. Lunnigan, who  
delves deeply into the dope each year for  
performances not covered in the usual  
list of records, Ruth drew a grand total  
of 120 passes during the 1920 campaign,  
or 32 more than any other American  
League player ever drew in a single sea-  
son. Ruth was hit three times during  
the year, making a total of 123 trips to  
first base without hitting. The great  
number of complimentary runs unquestion-  
ably prevented Babe from setting up an  
American League record for runs batted  
in. He sent 186 over the plate during the
