## LOCAL NEWS

Rev. N. B. Ryan yesterday continued his series of special sermons in Douglas street Methodist church. His subject was "Make All Things New." He was heard with close attention by a large congregation.

Rev. A. W. Meahan, D. D., announced at St. John the Baptist church yesterday morning that the Easter collection at the church had amounted to the sum of \$815.98.

There were great runs of gaspans in the harbor on Friday and Saturday nights last. Prices dropped from \$3.10 to \$1.50 a hundred. It is figured that the weir owned by Belyea Bros. took nearly 160,000 fish for the two nights.

Arthur Orton, returned soldier, was killed and Manning Dorsey of Fort Fairfield and Mary Kehlie of Grand Falls were injured, when an automobile upset near Aroostook on Saturday night. Orton owned and drove the car.

In the Mission church in Paradise row last night, Rev. L. R. Richards of Watford was the preacher. Rev. J. V. Young yesterday morning at Holy Eucharist in this church made an appeal for domestic missions, saying that some of the clergy in the country districts were very much underpaid.

A mass meeting for girls under the auspices of the C. G. I. T. was held yesterday afternoon in St. David's church and proved most interesting. There was a very large attendance and an impressive address was given by Rev. R. T. McKinn. Miss Mary Lewis led the service and Rev. Mr. MacKay offered prayer. The meeting was marked by some fine singing by the girls. It was arranged by the Girls' Cabinet, under Mrs. J. D. Hunter.

Rev. W. B. Williston, formerly of Bay du Vin, near Chatham, who for the last eleven years has been a missionary at the most westerly mission station in China, gave a very graphic description of his work in China and made a strong appeal for more men and women to dedicate themselves to mission work when he spoke to a large and greatly interested congregation in St. Luke's church last night. Rev. Mr. Williston is on his first furlough from China and has a wonderful account to give of the splendid opportunities for missionary work in China today.

Rev. H. Hamilton Brown of Grand Manan, formerly a chaplain with the British forces in Italy, occupied the pulpit in the Mission church last evening and told of his interesting experiences while in the army. He said that joining the forces in Italy he landed during a heavy bombardment and the staff had evacuated, leaving him to be welcomed by his superior, the assistant chaplain-general. Rev. Mr. Brown has had vast experiences during the recent war and his audience was greatly interested in hearing some of them related last evening.
