GERMANS HOPEFUL

Established in Great Britain or America-Enemy Products Could Be Imported

A fight is on again to admit German dyes to both Britain and the United dyes to both Britain and the United States. During the war British business men, and business men on this continent, swore that the buying of German aniline dyes was at an end. In fact, they intended to make sure that dyes of equal quality were made at home, and thus they would be forever independent of the great coal-tar syndicates of the Rhine. The British government organized a big corporation, putting up about six millions of capital itself, to manufacture dyes. Big United States companies, among them the Du Ponts of powder fame, began to organize along the same line. But within a year of the stopping of hostilities the demand for German dyes begins to crop up, and it is likely to grow in intensity. The simple reason is that while elementary colors or plain blues, blacks and browns may be made almost as well by British or United States factories, the German products are still superior in the secondary colors and the exquisite shades that are so important from a cloth-making point of view.



The argument advanced by one British textile manufacturer is this: "It may seem unpatriotic to buy German goods, but you must remember that British manufacturers cannot afford to pass up such goods from Germany when they cannot get anything so cheap or so suitable elsewhere. The great peril of protection is that it protects the inefficient or backward methods. It does not encourage the British dye manufacturer to improve his processes. It only forces the user of dyes to pay a higher price for an inferior article." Not long ago the head of the Badische Aniline Fabrik Company stated that he did not fear long for an inferior article." Not long ago the head of the Badische Aniline Fabrik Company stated that he did not fear long exclusion from the British markets. He figured that when the Yorkshire mill owner found he could get superior German dyes for about half the price of home-made dyes, he would not be long in getting them. The great discount on the German mark at present means that German goods can be exported far, far below ordinary trade values in Britain or the United States. One hundred marks is worth only about \$4, instead of a normal \$28 or \$24. But for the present, the British government has kept up the fence against importations of goods in what it terms "unstable industries," and in this list are most of the products in which Germany has been superior.
