# Higher Prices In Hardware Market

(Hardware and Metal, June 22.)

Turpentine provides the sensation of the markets for the week in an advance of 10c, a gallon, with every indication that further increases may become effective within the near future. Supplies are only fair and difficulties in securing further stocks seem to be multiplying almost daily. Delays over the railroads, with no intimation being given out by shippers on the sailing of ships, throw a cloud of uncertainty over the question of future arrivals.

The increasing strength of the pig lead market as evidenced in a series of advances during the last two or three weeks has resulted in new prices at higher levels being named on white lead in oil. The continued high market on (domestic) is, it is intimated, a contributory factor in this latest advance, which amounts to 50c, a 100 pounds.

Wire nails have undergone revision upward, present quotations ranging 10c, a 100 pounds above last-week's figures. Wire rods are unobtainable from the United States mills, and Canadian plants are experiencing considerable difficulty in maintaining output. These elements provide for a very strong market on nails and even higher figures may be named in the near future.

The strength of the sheet situation is shown in higher prices being named on corrugated sheets during the week. This is in line with predictions given in Hardware and Metal last week, and will very likely extend to metal ceilings, siding and shingles. Extruded and cast iron pipe are being held at unchanged levels for the present. Black steel sheets show an advance in some quarters ranging from 25c, to 50c, a 100 pounds over former figures.

The number of miscellaneous items to be listed this week is somewhat smaller than usual, but the tendency throughout is upward. Extension ladders have made advance, along with blow torches, the pots, sash weights, sledge bells and vises.

A heavy sale of guns and rifles is reported, with a slight firming of prices in some quarters; stocks are becoming pretty well depleted, retailers showing a fair cover for their fall requirements. Business is seasonably good.

# The Grocery Market

(Canadian Grocer.)

Maximum prices have been named by prime growers and growers of raisins on this year's crop, and it is intimated these have been approved by the food administration, based at Washington. Prices named are higher than last year and even higher than the trade generally expected. Trading will not begin prior to July 15, and the intervening period will enable wholesalers to determine their requirements to a large extent.

Wheat allotment of coffee to be handled through United States ports has been determined by food boards at Washington and Ottawa. Canada has been allowed for the year 70 cent of last year's total, which will be distributed on a pro rata basis.

It may be stated that there is much confidence in the two countries for the outlook for business. From both city and country there is better demand than there was last year, and the supplies of nuts and dried fruits are harder to obtain, and the general tendencies are to higher prices.

Curry powder, saffron and rice stocks have been augmented by recent arrivals. The time to time buyers are in receipt of belated shipments.

The sugar situation seems to be fairly normal. It is feared at first that the U.S. activity on the American coast might curtail Canadian sugar supplies, and rumors were even current that Cuban stocks would be available. The menace did not prove as serious as was expected, however, and refiners have been able to obtain their requirements without great difficulty in getting supplies.

A former undertone to the market on nuts is apparent during the week, and some arrivals during the past week or two show a higher range of quotations than those formerly ruling. Some shipments of Chinese peanuts are reported at the coast, with suggestion that a shortage of nut feeds expected towards August and September, the Ontario government has solicited the assistance of millers in preparing a balanced ration, using cottonseed meal, oil cake and other ingredients. Whether success will attend efforts along these lines is a matter of speculation and the process of distribution through farmers' clubs is likely to place restrictions on the general use of this product.

The United States government has done away with the import tariff rate on tea which has existed for years. This is causing trade some concern, and the tea trade association has been in communication with Washington, and received indications that a new rate of 18.75 per 100 pounds for carload shipment has been fixed, as against previous rate of \$1.10.

The sugar situation is considered fairly nominal. Very good supplies continue to reach the market, and the demand is being readily taken care of. Owing to lateness of season the demand is not very heavy as yet. The United States food administration have advised all canners and others using sugar for preserving purposes cover for their season's requirements now.

Millers report that domestic flour business is being curbed owing to the fact that the amount of flour offered to the Wheat Export Company for delivery by the end of June shows a considerable balance undelivered. All mills have been instructed to get unshipped balance to seaboard by June 30, or little more than a week's time. Domestic stocks will need replenishing in July, and millers are in hopes that wheat supplies will be sufficient to keep them operating most of next month.

The feed outlook for next fall is full.

Swag supplies are coming along in splendid quantities and the retail demand is very heavy. It is a little too far ahead to state whether there will be sufficient sugar available for preserving purposes, but a continuation of present rate of deliveries will assist in this result.

An advance of 40c, per 100 pounds has been made in prices by one refiner.

# FAST FISH FREIGHT SERVICE

Ottawa, June 24—Owing to the lack of sufficient express refrigerator cars and the necessity of conserving coal, the plan to increase the service for fish shipments, supplied under the auspices of the Canada Food Board, has been altered, and a fish freight service will be established instead.

Under the new arrangement, a fast fish freight service between Milgrov, Halifax, and Montreal, with connections through to Toronto, has been introduced by Mr. Hayes of the Canadian Government Railways.

# CANADIAN FINANCE

Ottawa, June 25—Sir Thomas White said yesterday that the New York market was practically upon a seven per cent basis for the higher class of corporate issues securities. With regard to the suggestion, frequently made of a large dominion government issue in New York as a correction of exchange, he said that such an issue could be made only upon a six and a quarter or six and a half per cent basis, with flotation charges of three per cent. The reason for these high interest rates was the financing, present and prospective, for Liberty Loan bonds.
