Millan, Feb. 24.—"I'll order an ordinary funeral, probably few will follow me to my grave, and fewer still will shed a tear, whereas if I order a magnificent funeral, a crowd of poor devils will enjoy a pleasant time."

The cortege took a half day to reach the burial place.

BORDEN IS
AT POINT
OF PISTOLNationalists Demand Their Way
on Separate Schools And
The Navy

BOURASSA IN OTTAWA
"The Man Behind" Goes to Capital to See That Programme is Carried Out—Plain Statement in His Newspaper

Ottawa, Feb. 25.—There is now no longer any doubt of Henri Bourassa's determination to triumph over the Borden government in both the Manitoba separate school and the navy question.

The Nationalists demand that the government remain to remain master of the administration, and the Nationalist members in Ottawa today make no secret of their opinion that the government will make the concessions demanded in both matters.

Mr. Bourassa himself arrived in Ottawa this afternoon, and in conference with Hon. Mr. Pelletier, the postmaster-general, the situation has apparently reached the most acute stage yet experienced. It was at 1 o'clock this morning before Dr. Eugene Piquet, member for L'Assomption, and a group of his fellow Nationalists, left the parliament buildings after a long Saturday night conference.

The Nationalists persist that Armand Lavergne's mission was to sound out the government "game down" on both counts. The sudden arrival of Mr. Bourassa himself today, however, clothes their declarations with some doubt.

Mr. Lavergne arrived in Ottawa last week, immediately upon learning the announcement of Premier Borden that he would move the house into consideration of the Manitoba separate school question at Friday's sitting. It was proposed by the government at that time to leave the school question over until the next session.

On receipt of the news of Mr. Borden's announcement, Mr. Bourassa, who was in Quebec, is reported by his followers to have sent a long and emphatic telegram demanding that the premier's programme be abandoned, and that the matter should not be brought before the house until the coming week, a mandate which was evidently obeyed, since Mr. Borden was disappointed the crowded galleries by making no allusion to the subject proposed.

The Nationalist leader was unable at that time to visit Ottawa himself, being engaged at the Quebec legislature with the ultramontane issue he has raised in connection with the case of the late Archbishop of Montreal, the late Cardinal Beaudry.

Mr. Bourassa's return to Ottawa, accompanied by his followers, was a long and emphatic telegram demanding that the premier's programme be abandoned, and that the matter should not be brought before the house until the coming week, a mandate which was evidently obeyed, since Mr. Borden was disappointed the crowded galleries by making no allusion to the subject proposed.

The minister of public works was a colleague of both Archbishops Beaudry and Langevin at Montreal for some eight years, and special efforts were made to secure his allegiance, while the premier-general was threatened with political extinction if he failed to do so.

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LORD FURNESS
PURCHASER OF
WARREN LINEBoston Has Cable News of Sale
of Fleet of Freight Steamers in
England

Boston, Feb. 26.—Dispatches from London announce the sale of the Warren line of freight steamers, which ply between Boston and Liverpool, to Lord Furness, one of the largest shipping owners in the world. He is also interested in the Furness-Withy and the Wilson-Furness-Land lines, both operating steamships between Boston and Europe, and other lines. The price paid for the new line is said to be about \$400,000, which represents \$20 a share.

Along the Boston water front the announcement caused much surprise. Willam Litchfield, the Boston agent of the Warren line, and W. Miller Stewart, agent of the Furness-Withy line, both professed ignorance of the sale.

George Warren, former head of the Warren line, died in England recently. It is thought by steamship men that the line which bears his name was sold out to clear up the estate.

The Warren line has been a distinctively Boston line since the beginning of steam navigation. It grew out of the old White Diamond line of clipper ships. Several years ago the Warren line brought large numbers of stowage passengers from Liverpool to Boston, but in recent years the line has conducted a freight business. Up to 1907 and 1908 the line did not carry freight business between Boston and Europe.

The ships now owned by the Warren line are the Michigan, Sagamore, Sachem, and the Iowa. The first three make trips between Boston and Liverpool, the latter between Liverpool and ports in the Gulf of Mexico.

DESOLATION CAUSED BY MOROCCO FLOODS
Twelve People and 23 Horses Perish and Crops are Destroyed

Madrid, Feb. 24.—A telegram from Tangier states that a bad weather continued there, and in the interior of Morocco, where great violence, communications being interrupted. A caravan which attempted to ford the River Mox-el-Kanif, half way between Tangier and Arzila, was caught in a sudden cloudburst, torrents of water rushing down from the Ben-Mesmar mountains. The unhappy travelers had no time to save themselves, and they all perished. They were twelve in number, twenty-three horses.

Soon afterwards the whole region was invaded by the waters. The floods have spread everywhere, and all the crops have been destroyed. The irretrievable torrents have torn up huge trees, and carried along with them dead animals and the ruins of dwellings. In many other regions in Morocco the same horrible picture of ruin and desolation has been repeated.
