MAN HAD TWO WIVES

BUT ESCAPES PENALTY FOR BIGAMY—PECULIAR CIRCUMSTANCES.

Toronto, Aug. 11.—Each of two women to whom James Farewell was married, appeared in the police court today, and the defense admitted the two marriages, but Farewell escaped punishment after the facts had been stated.

Mr. Godfrey, Farewell's counsel, wanted to take the case to a jury but as the prisoner had already pleaded to be tried summarily, Magistrate Denison decided to save the country a sum variously estimated at from \$60 to \$400, which it would have cost to try the case by jury.

A young, small woman, Elizabeth Jane Nash, swore she had been married to Farewell last March at St. Stephen's rectory in Bellevue avenue by the Rev. Dr. Bronghall.

"We don't deny it," said Mr. Godfrey.

Nash Jane Martineau told of being married at Port Perry in 1871 to Farewell, who was then 20 years of age.

"The last time I saw him," said the first wife, "was in the police court at Grand Rapids, 23 years ago."

"Where is he now?" asked Mr. Curry.

"There he is, the miserable brute," said the witness, pointing to the dock.

LIVE TOGETHER FIVE YEARS.

According to wife No. 1, she and Farewell lived together five or six years.

Then Farewell went to Michigan and she went back to her parents. Farewell wrote asking his father-in-law's intervention with the wife but the wife answered the letter, and told Farewell she wouldn't go back to him.

Farewell did three years in prison in Michigan for peaking into a fur store, according to Mrs. Farewell.

She waited three years after Farewell left her and then, having paid \$1 and being assured "in the state house" that she was free to marry, she married a man again.

Farewell stated he had heard in 1880 of his wife's divorce and marriage, and that it was therefore after a wait of 25 years that he married again to be now dead.

Cross-examined by Mr. Curry he admitted having lived at different places with a third woman whom he believed to be now dead.

"She induced me to marry her," said Farewell, pointing to his second wife.

"Oh, I deny that," said she, rising with eyes flashing.

"She made the arrangements," said Farewell.

"That's not a mean thing to say," said Mr. Curry. "I suppose some poor woman induced you to commit the burglary."

PRISONER BLAMES OTHERS.

"No, I was led into that by a man," said Farewell.

"How long have you been in prison?" was the next question.

"Larger than I deserved," was the answer. "A man has to be very smart to keep out of the burglar and get caught."

"You tempted me—some old story," said Mr. Curry.

"Are you so paroled?" asked Mr. Curry.

"No, it's expired," said Farewell.

"What's the good of all these questions?" asked Mr. Godfrey.

"I don't know," said the man. "That will do. This man is so easily led I think I will let him up."

Mr. Godfrey showed his Worshipful that Farewell had been led into crime or written to the first wife for such a long time, could not be held guilty of heavy.

Farewell was discharged on the bigamy charge, but held because he is said to be wanted on the parole at Whitby.

London, Aug. 12.—Parliament was prorogued yesterday morning after a chequered session, which will long be remembered for the unprecedented number of votes of censure and motions for adjournment moved with a view to the embarrassment of the Government.

The session produced two measures of sociological interest—the Alien's Act and the Unemployed Workmen's Act, the latter creating facilities for the providing of work and wages for all able-bodied applicants—and the conflict between the Scottish churches was also settled. Otherwise, the work of the session was mostly of a routine character.

Only 50 M.P.'s Present.

Not more than 50 members of the House of Commons assisted at yesterday's closing scene. The Black Rod summoned them to the House of Lords, where there were only two peers, besides the three royal commissioners. The Lord High Chancellor, the Earl of Halsbury, read King Edward's speech, the most interesting clauses of which, from an international point of view, referred to the peace negotiations and the crisis in Sweden and Norway.

Regarding the peace negotiations, the speaker said: "The initiative of the President of the United States are about to be entered upon between the Russian and Japanese Governments for the purpose of terminating the deplorable conflict still proceeding in the Far East. It is my earnest hope that they may lead to a lasting and mutually honorable peace."

Sweden and Norway.

Concerning the Swedish-Norwegian situation, the speaker says: "A dissolution of the union between Sweden and Norway apparently is imminent. I am confident that, by the exercise of wise moderation on each side, a settlement will be arrived at which will be acceptable to both countries, and that it will be of such a nature as to enable my Government to maintain with the people of the Scandinavian Peninsula the same friendly relations which have prevailed in the past."

The speech refers to the continued friendly relations with other powers, and "cordially hopes" that the outcome of the conference summoned by the King of Italy to consider the establishment of an international institute dealing with agricultural information, "will be of service to agriculturists, both at home and abroad."

The speech then proceeds: "My Government has received from the Dominion of Canada a most patriotic offer to assume the entire administrative and financial responsibility for the defense of Halifax and Esquimaux, and that offer has been cordially accepted. The transfer of control will take place at an early date under arrangements in regard to which my Government have been fortunate to obtain the fullest and most appreciative co-operation of the Dominion Government."

Other than, the speech was of no general interest.

Parliament was nominally adjourned to Oct. 25, when it will be further adjourned.

Canada's "Most Patriotic Offer" Cordially Accepted.

PARLIAMENT IS PROROGUED

Transfer of the Defence at Halifax and Esquimaux Referred to In His Majesty's Speech—Hopes For Lasting and Mutually Honorable Peace For Russia and Japan—Sweden and Norway.

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ACCIDENT AT G. T. R.

FREIGHT AND EXCURSION TRAIN COLLIDE—NO ONE HURT.

An accident which might have been serious occurred in the east end of the G. T. R. yard here this morning. The engine of a local freight was foul of the west-bound main line when an excursion train from Brantford to Detroit pulled into the yard. It is said that the semaphore was against the excursion train. Fortunately the passenger train was not going at a very high rate of speed and the damage was slight. The pilots on both engines were demolished but no one was hurt. The accident delayed the excursion train from Brantford and the Karn-Bain excursion train from Woodstock about forty minutes.

The passengers on Express train No. 6, due here at 3:40 p.m. yesterday were somewhat frightened when they saw the train turn into the yard and keep on going west. Something went wrong with the air-brakes and when the train here was reached the train had to be stopped with the hand brake. But before this was accomplished the train had reached the Westman street crossing. No damage was done, but a east-bound freight, which could be seen coming about a mile up the track made some of the passengers a little nervous.

1,496 TYPHOID CASES.

995 DEATHS REPORTED IN NEW YORK FROM BAD WATER.

New York, Aug. 11.—That New York city is in the grip of a typhoid epidemic that will not be checked until cold weather sets in, is the statement made by Health Commissioner Darling.

According to figures given out by Dr. Herman Hagar, medical officer of the department, there had been 1,496 cases of typhoid fever and 995 deaths in greater New York.

In proportion to the population there have been more cases and more deaths in Brooklyn than in any other borough, and this fact Dr. Hagar attributes largely to the water supply of that borough.

Dr. Hagar and Dr. J. S. Billings, chief of the division of communicable diseases, are in charge of the epidemic, and a house to house canvass for each of typhoid fever has begun under their direction today in the Throgs Neck Ward of Brooklyn.

A ROLLING BOOM LOG

Caused Accident to Three Young Ladies in a Canoe.

DOLLIE WATSON DROWNS

Miss Watson Lost Her Life In Attempting to Assist Her Friend, Who Was In Peril on a Rolling Log—Daughter of James Watson of Canadian Steel Plant, and Steno-grapher in Sawmill Office.

Shaglit Ste Marie, Aug. 12.—Miss Dollie Watson, 18 years old, daughter of James Watson of the steel plant was drowned in the river above the rapids yesterday afternoon.

In company with Miss Thompson and a younger sister, she had been canoeing. Desiring to change positions in the canoe, she moved beside a boom log. Miss Thompson got out on the log and it began rolling with her. Miss Watson attempted to assist her from her position in the canoe, with the result that both fell into the water.

A man who saw the accident rescued Miss Thompson, but the other girl disappeared. The body was recovered in thirty minutes, but efforts at resuscitation were of no avail. Miss Watson was employed as stenographer in the office of the Lake Superior Corporation sawmill.

Thrown Off Street Car.

Kingsport, Aug. 12.—Thursday evening Charles Harvey of St. George's Cathedral school was on a street car on Alfred street, and severely injured. He was rendered unconscious and received a scalp wound.

C. P. R. Conductor Killed.

Monroe, N. Y., Aug. 12.—Conductor W. E. Thompson of the C. P. R. was killed in the discharge of his duties at Onondaga's gravel pit yesterday. He fell from the top of a car and several other cars passed over his body.

PAROLED IN SOAP.

Great Tanks Explode and the Fireman Have Dangerous Task.

New York, Aug. 12.—Twenty firemen were killed, injured and unconscious, from boiling soap, five of them very badly, yesterday afternoon, when a fire in W. H. Kingston's soap factory, No. 125 West 12th street, yesterday. Tanks containing 75,000 gallons of soap fat exploded after a fire in the three-story building had burst through a vat of hot soap. For five hours the firemen fought this new danger, crawling on the sidewalks on all fours outside the burning building, and in a place where a cloud of smoke, which poured from the factory, was so thick that the firemen could not see their way.

Before the fire was under control, six of the firemen had been carried to the hospital, and many others, who did not go, were barely able to walk. The fire was extinguished at about 4:30 p.m.

The soap grocer continued to burn all day, and by night, when the fire was under control, six unconscious firemen had been taken from the premises. The smoke was so thick that the firemen could not see their way.

Many heroic rescues were made. The fireman, Martin, who was killed, was a vat of hot soap in the fireman's chimney of engine 24 who had fallen unconscious. Both the fireman and his horse were carried with the fat of a 2,000 pound vat through the floor into a cellar room, where a strong fire had been formed from the water and soap mixture. Scolding the building chimney was involved and internally injured during his fall, while the fireman fell into the vat, which scalded him and set his hair on fire. He was partly kept himself out of the vat, and it was so dark that he could not see, but, finding something in the vat, he took hold of it, and pulled himself out of the vat. He was then carried to the hospital, where he died.
