## THE SITUATION IN NORTHERN MOLDAVIA IS GROWING WORSE

VIENNA, March 22.—The seriousness of the situation in Northern Moldavia growing out of the Agrarian disorders has not been exaggerated, according to the latest telegraphic reports reaching here from Cernovitz on the border. From the estimates of the damage made tonight it appears that four hundred farms in Moldavia have been devastated, 8,000 fugitives have fled over the Rumanian frontier into Austria, and a total of 10,000 Jews are homeless. The number of dead and wounded cannot be given accurately, but the reports today give a total of about 35 killed and about 150 wounded. The outbreak seems to have been partially suppressed today. The Rumanian government is still sending troops into the afflicted district. Practically the entire province of Moldavia has been involved.

The movement is really more agrarian than anti-semitic. The peasants are in revolt against the great landowners who have leased half the cultivated land in Moldavia. The absent landlords who control the trust happen to be Jews, and these districts the fire of the peasants down upon any and all Jews that they meet and this anti-party is added to by strong racial feeling arising from other causes. At Yashui, to the south of Jassy, a body of two thousand peasants forced their way into the town. The prefect of Yashui did not have sufficient troops at his command to stop the onward march of the infuriated countrymen. He stood by a helpless witness while the rioters, in an incredibly short space of time, plundered practically all the buildings on the three principal streets of Yashui, and then set them on fire. The peasants had looted freely and the fire completed the work of destruction. The prefect sent in a hurried appeal for reinforcements and the peasants in ignorance of this step, remained in town until the soldiers arrived. There then ensued a serious fight up and down the burned streets. The soldiers were victorious and twenty rioters were killed and many were wounded.

The entire Rumanian district was up in arms. Here the authorities were powerless and the peasants pillaged, burned and devastated everywhere. All the buildings in the villages of Halanesti, Herlesti, Holistend and Nitelusen were demolished and the villages are now nothing more than heaps of ruins. It is estimated that not less than 8,000 fugitives have crossed the frontier into the Austrian province of Bukovina, where they are being cared for as well as possible.

The most serious fight of today occurred near Piatra, a town about sixty miles southwest of Jassy. Several thousand peasants marched against this town where an entire regiment of

## WENT INSANE AND TRIED TO SHOOT EVERYBODY

Austrian Deputy Blazed Away With Gun and Revolver—Wife and Family Had Exciting Escape

VIENNA, March 22.—The other day Herr Gebler, a deputy to the Reichsrath residing at Falkenau in Bohemia, a personage who is well known in industrial and political circles suddenly became insane. There was an exciting scene at the house when his wife and two servants appeared at one of the windows crying loudly for help. She said as coherently as her state of terror would permit that her husband had threatened to murder her and the servants and set fire to the house. In her despair she begged that somebody would enter the house and take away her children.

Meanwhile Herr Gebler, himself, was seen at another window. He had a rifle and a revolver, and with one then with the other he started a fusillade into the street. Shot succeeded shot and nobody dared venture near the house or within range of the firearms of the madman. At length, however, a courageous man named Popelch, by inducing Gebler to believe that he had pressing business with him managed to enter the house and secured a temporary cessation of the firing. During which Frau Gebler, her children, and the servants fled from the building. They were rapidly followed by Popelch at whom Gebler fired but fortunately missed his aim. Altogether Gebler fired 600 rounds and in the course of his bombardment of the street several persons were injured. Gendarmes closed all the entrances to the street and towards evening they ventured into the house, seized Gebler and conveyed him to an asylum. Inside his dwelling was found a regular arsenal and there still remain 500 unused cartridges.

## COMMERCIAL

### EXCITEMENT REIGNS IN FINANCIAL CIRCLES.

BERLIN, March 22.—There was a panic on the Bourse here today owing to yesterday's advances in New York. Prices in all departments suffered a sharp relapse, mining shares losing ten points. Baltimore and Ohio and Pennsylvania declined five points, and a nervous feeling prevailed with a declining tendency in almost every section, due to yesterday's break in Americans, fears of the outcome of the settlement, and advices from Paris and Berlin. Americans were the weakest section at the opening. Then the Continent sold and prices fell further, closing slightly above the worst quotations of the day, but with two to five points loss. Canadian Pacific closed ten points lower than yesterday.

## REPRODUCE ON THE STAGE INCIDENTS IN DIPLOMACY.

The Famous Forgeries of Bismarck Which Had Much to do With European Politics in the Last Half Century.

BERLIN, March 22.—The German Government seems to be becoming more and more tolerant in matters of official forgery. A place has just been given at Breslau entitled "Moderne Diplomaten" which would certainly have been forbidden by the censor a couple of years ago on political grounds. In fact less than three years ago the authorities in Berlin forbade a piece by Oscar Blumenthal because, in spite of the scene being laid in Spain in the Sixteenth century, it only too transparently placed the Bismarck crisis on the stage. This official interdiction was the making of the piece. If it had depended on its merits it is to be doubted whether it would have lasted for more than one week. But the prohibition of the Prussian police transformed the performance at Hamburg into a national event. All the Berlin newspapers submitted their dramatic critics to the Hanseatic city and the piece and plot were described in telegrams columns long. Dr. Blumenthal then published it in volume form and sold fifty thousand copies. But for the police it may be doubted whether even five hundred copies would have been sold.

This may have taught the Prussian authorities a lesson and may explain how "Moderne Diplomaten" has been given at the Schauspielhaus in the Silesian capital without any attempt at interference by the authorities. It treats of even a more delicate topic. It brings on the stage French, German, English and Russian diplomats of such modern date as the year 1886. The plot, moreover, turns on the famous Bismarck forgeries which were named off on the stage by Alexander III. by the enemies of the Iron Chancellor. Who executed them and what were their exact contents no one ever knew, but it is certain that those documents for years played an important role in European diplomacy. As nearly as can be made out they were a series of confidential letters supposed to have been written by Prince Bismarck to a German ambassador at a European court in which the Chancellor explained Germany's secret designs on the Balkans, secret designs which were just the contrary of her public policy. These letters came into the hands of the Empress of Russia. As a Dane she had never forgiven Prince Bismarck for the Schleswig-Holstein war, and she was undoubtedly only too glad to believe that he was playing a double game. The Czar also believed the documents to be genuine and this belief it was that gave rise to the new Russian foreign policy which culminated in the Franco-Prussian alliance. In spite of Alexander III's pro-German sympathies this love and respect for the old Emperor William had been boundless) his conviction of the perfidy of Prince Bismarck caused him to do all in his power to avoid close relations with Germany.

In 1887 the Czar went against his will, paid a visit to Berlin and there occurred a historic and dramatic scene at the Russian Embassy which did much to change the destinies of Europe. Prince Bismarck as Imperial Chancellor had, of course, to pay a formal visit to the Russian Imperial guest. He was cordially received at first. Then in the course of a conversation the Czar lost all command of himself in presence of what he regarded as the hypocrisy and duplicity of the German statesman, and he burst out on him with reproaches for the double game he was playing. In order to con-

front him he produced the famous documents and then the house of cards collapsed. In five minutes Prince Bismarck convinced Alexander III. that they were impudent forgeries and the whole intrigue so laboriously built up crumbled to pieces. The curious thing was that from that moment no statesman stood higher in the confidence of the Czar than the Iron Chancellor and though this did not prevent the entente with France from becoming closer, it never, as long as Prince Bismarck was in power reached a hard and fast alliance. Another famous forgery connected with Bismarck is recalled. About a score of years ago M. Alfred Edwards was proprietor of the Matin. One day a man who had some vague connection with the diplomatic service came to him and offered to sell him a confidential document written by Prince Bismarck. The document was submitted to experts who were of the opinion that it was genuine. The Matin was just about to pay the \$2,000 asked for it when as a last precaution it was submitted to a well known official of the Ecole de Chartes. He looked it over carefully and said: "When you man comes hand him over to the police. He spelled 'Bismarck' without the 'C.'"
