A remarkable case, in which a haunted house played a prominent part, has just been heard at Musjick. A family named Wolf hired a farm-house from an aged widow living near Amherst, the

house suited them, but the presence of the old woman in the house did not, and they began to supply the premises with a number of ghosts, as they knew the woman was most superstitious and in daily and nightly terror of supernatural beings. Wolf, with his wife and two daughters, installed altogether seventeen ghosts. First they tried wicked spirits, then angelic ones, with the result that the wretched widow was nearly driven crazy by her nightly visitants. The spirits injured the cows, killed cocks and hens, stole eggs and butter, and made unearthly midnight noises. Then Wolf offered help to cleanse the house of spirits for a consideration, and in process of time these cleansing operations cost over 14,000.

The widow was robbed of all she had, and was, in addition, suffering from brain fever when the police began to take notice. The result was that Wolf was sentenced to five years' penal servitude and to pay a heavy fine and to suffer ten years' loss of civil rights; his wife and one of his daughters to two years and the other daughter to eighteen months' imprisonment. This family had regular rehearsals of their nocturnal swindle before practicing it on their victim.

How The Lamp Chimney Was Discovered.

The lamp chimney of every-day use is to be attributed to a child's restlessness. Simple Remedies

INSTEAD OF COD LIVER OIL.—Those people who cannot digest cod-liver oil will find a gill of raw cream taken at night very beneficial.

FOR HOARSENESS.—If you are hoarse, lemon-juice squeezed onto soft sugar till it is like a syrup, and a few drops of glycerine added, relieves the hoarseness at once.

HOT HANDS.—There are a variety of recipes for this trouble, but this one is the best. Place about a teaspoonful of water in the water-pail, wash your hands in it. Afterward sprinkle with rice powder, which you can procure of any druggist.

SORE THROATS.—Infants and young children with "sore throats" should be given occasional sips of a mixture of a teaspoonful of borax in a wineglassful of glycerine. The glycerine lubricates the throat, and borax is a first-class antiseptic for all throat conditions.

A SIMPLE CORN CURE.—Bathe the feet well in hot water for thirty minutes every third night (every night is best), removing all the hard parts possible. Never use a knife, razor or any cutting instrument on them. After bathing and rubbing off horny substance, apply a small piece of absorbent cotton wet with aromatic spirits of ammonia. The ammonia must be applied every night, whether bathing takes place or not.

HOMemade COLD CREAM.—A very good pure cold cream may be made at home as follows: 4 oz. of rose-water, 4 oz. of oil of sweet almonds, 1 oz. of spermaceti and 1 oz. of white wax. Melt oil, wax and spermaceti, removing the pan from the fire to pour in rose water, beat to a froth with an egg whisk, perfuming with any scent preferred. A few drops of tincture of benzoin will keep the cream from becoming rancid.

THE CURE OF TONGUE.—The tongue quickly betrays all disturbances in the economy of the body: in health it is clean, moderately red in color, and moist. When it is furred or "coated" it indicates fever, some impurity in the mouth, as foul or decayed teeth, or trouble with the digestive organs. If fever be the cause, the temperature of the body will be above the normal, 98 1-2 degrees Fahrenheit. It is easy to determine if bad teeth are at fault: if these be all right, seek for the source of the trouble in the stomach, liver or bowels. Constipation will produce a bad breath and a furred tongue. With nervous disease a dry tongue is a sign of nervous depression; and a pale, flabby tongue indicates an anemic condition.
