**Second Son of King George
Coming to Ancient Colony
— Officers of the Bisley
Team Named.**

Home Rule Bill Next Week.
London, May 1.—The Home Rule Bill is to be introduced again next week in the House of Commons last session.

King's Son to Newfoundland.
St. John's, Nfld., May 1.—Prince Albert Frederick, the second son of King George V., will reach this city on June 28, according to a despatch from the British admiralty received by Governor Walter Davidson. The Prince will come on board the warship Cumberland. He will remain in Newfoundland for two weeks, spending the last week in salmon fishing on the west coast of the island.

Madero's Sister Bride in New York.
New York, May 1.—Sister Mercedes Madero, sister of the late president of Mexico, was married today to Senor Antonio G. Canizales, formerly a member of the Mexican Congress from Lower California. The marriage took place at the new Spanish church recently dedicated by Cardinal Farley. Senor Canizales and his bride will leave for an extended honeymoon in Europe. Senor Canizales, who is wealthy, is a member of an old Mexican family, his grandfather having been president of Mexico three times before the rise of Porfirio Diaz.

Many Notables are Coming.
London, May 1.—The Dominion of Canada is going to be a favorite holiday resort during the parliamentary recess this year. In addition to Viscount Haldane (the Lord Chancellor), the Right Hon. Herbert Samuel (the Postmaster General), and Sir J. A. Simon (the Solicitor General), it is now learned that twenty members of parliament, who have returned from the invitation of the Australian parliament association to visit the antipodes this summer, will endeavor to travel via the Dominion. The party includes members of both sides of the house and leaves England at the end of July.

Shot on Montreal Street.
Montreal, May 1.—In a street revolver battle this morning after P. Stathos, a storekeeper in Maisonneuve had refused a demand for money from a couple of thugs who held him up, Stathos was shot in the shoulder before he could fire. Though wounded, he engaged his assailants with his own revolver, but when their weapons were useless they ran away. Stathos will recover.

TO FINISH 120 MILES OF VALLEY RAILWAY BY NOVEMBER FIRST

President Gould Made Inter- esting Announcement at Meeting of Local Govern- ment Yesterday.

Fredericton, May 1.—This morning President A. R. Gould and Chief Engineer Ross Thompson of the St. John and Quebec Railway Company appeared before the government and matters relating to the railway were discussed. Mr. Gould said that having the bridges, the material for which had been delayed as a result of the floods recently, the company were in a fair way to have the 120 miles of road from Centreville to Gasquet completed within the time specified by the contract, before Nov. 1, 1913.

The applications for incorporation of the following companies were approved: New Brunswick Transportation Company, Ltd., Kingston Peninsula Telephone Company, Ltd., Agricultural Society No. 122 of Carleton County; Dalhousie Land Company, Ltd.; Carlisle Paterson Company, Ltd.; Fredericton Steamboat Company, Ltd.; Welford and Hampstead Telephone Company, Ltd.; Day's Lake Fish and Game Club.

The sheriffs were reappointed for the year and the revisors for the province were also appointed.

SHIPLABORERS STRIKE ON THE MIRAMICHI
