JORDAN MEMORIAL SANATORIUM PRIDE OF NEW BRUNSWICK

The History of Institution and Its Remarkable Success
Evidence of What a Noble Woman and Native of River
Glade Did—Needs of Sanatorium.

The Jordan Memorial Sanatorium, at River Glade, Westmorland County, New Brunswick, is an institution of which the province should be justly proud.

It is an institution for the treatment of Incipient Pulmonary Tuberculosis. It was made possible through the munificence of the province by Mrs. James C. Jordan of a property which, together with the original gift of buildings and land, and the additional made later, is valued at well over one hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$150,000). To this the province has added approximately forty-five thousand (\$45,000) more, which gives us an institution ranking with the very best and the very first of its kind on this continent.

Native of Province.

The donor, Mrs. Jordan, was formerly a resident of this province, her birthplace being near where the sanatorium is located. She was now a resident of San Francisco.

The buildings are situated four and three quarters miles from River Glade Station, in a most charming locality, where field, forest and river give variety to the scenery, and where the air is absolutely pure.

The beauty of the scenery about the sanatorium has recently been greatly enhanced by the placing of a dam across the river, just below the buildings, thus forming a beautiful lake of about fifteen acres. The dam is a gift of Mrs. Jordan and is known as a fill dam, i. e., it has a central concrete core with an earth fill on either side. It is 775 feet long and has on top a roadway, with an ornamental bridge at one end, with spillway under it and a roadway at the other end. Altogether it presents a substantial and attractive bit of engineering.

Former Summer Home.

The buildings on the property consist of the large mansion house, formerly occupied by Mrs. Jordan as a summer home. In this house, in the year 1910 the City of St. John reported 117 deaths from this disease. The report in 1916 indicates that there has been a constant and substantial decrease in the number of deaths during the past five years, something like ten per cent. per year.

There seems to be little doubt that the institution under review has contributed its full share in bringing about this improvement, for, in addition to the indirect influence exerted, monthly clinics are conducted by it at St. John, Fredericton and Moncton. It should be remembered that the work of an institution of this kind is less spectacular than that of a general hospital, but the results are none the less important.

The Needs of the Institution.

First, it needs to be given well merited publicity. The people should be made acquainted with the work being done for the largest possible institution, seeking to solve one of the people's gravest problems and is in a fair way of so doing.

Again, more people who are afflicted with the disease should take advantage of the treatment given here, so that the greatest possible good may come to the largest possible numbers, at the least possible expense.

Another need is a good road from River Glade station to the sanatorium. At a comparatively small outlay such a road could be constructed. This would make for economy, for at present horses are being used to do the trucking which could be done at much less expense by a motor truck if a suitable road could be had.

Lastly, the commission, in their efforts to make the institution a success, should have and receive the sympathetic and moral support of all the people of the province. If these things can be, it will not be long before the people with one voice will be singing the praises of one of the very best public institutions to be found anywhere.

NEW BRANCH OF HOSPITAL COMMISSION

Former New Brunswickers
Take Charge of Transport
Department—Hospital
Cars Admired by Local
Residents.

Captain J. B. Lambkin, chief transport officer of the Canadian Hospital Commission Command, was in the city yesterday a guest at the Royal Hotel. He was accompanied to the city by his assistant, Lieut. E. W. Kidner, who is also a conducting officer. Both officers are former New Brunswickers and are being warmly welcomed to the city. Captain Lambkin was formerly assistant general passenger agent for the Intercolonial Railway. He has had an extensive experience in handling traffic, having been for thirty years actively engaged with the C. P. R. and the I. C. R.

Lieut. Kidner is a son of R. B. Kidner, formerly of Fredericton. Mr. Kidner, ex. is now the pre-occupational secretary for the Dominion Hospital Commission, having charge of over sixty hospitals throughout Canada. Lieut. Kidner was wounded with the Royal Naval Air Service. He had seen much action before he was forced to retire from this fascinating branch of the service.

Neither Captain Lambkin or Lieut. Kidner would say anything relative to their mission to the city, but it is known they are here to superintend the transport of the wounded soldiers. Upon arrival in the city the soldiers will be placed in the new military discharge hospital and there given medical treatment for a few days. As soon as their condition permits they will be sent to their respective homes. Hospital cars are being equipped both by the Canadian Pacific and Intercolonial Railways. One of the new hospital cars was in the city yesterday and was greatly admired. The car has accommodation for three nursing sisters, a doctor and his assistant, three orderlies, besides eight or ten stretcher patients.

Captain Lambkin and Lieut. Kidner are making their headquarters at Hallifax. They are really opening a new branch of the hospital work as it was only the decision of the government to establish discharge hospitals that served to make necessary the transport work of the wounded men. It is likely that as soon as the work is advanced a large staff will be required to handle the traffic.

A companion was caught in a severe storm in the bay and both were drowned.

The young lady who died was beloved by a wide circle of friends.

Mrs. Mary Gunn, one of the oldest and most respected residents of that section of Westmorland, Mrs. Gunn was born in Dublin, Ireland, 90 years ago. She and her husband, the late John W. Gunn, lived on the Miramichi and later in Fredericton, where Mr. Gunn was engaged in shipbuilding for many years. Twelve years ago they removed to Moncton, Mr. Gunn dying five years ago. Mrs. Gunn is survived by five sons, John C., deputy fire chief of Moncton; William, chief of police of Shediac; Albert and Benjamin of Moncton; and James T. of Boston, all three daughters, Mrs. Cassie Lelidon of Moncton, Mrs. William Sides of Dorchester and Mrs. Henry Osborne of Maryville.
