Want Marsh Road Put In Good Shape

Delegation Appears Before Common Council — Will Ask Government to Divide Money from Amusements and Auto Taxes.

At the committee meeting of the Common Council, held yesterday morning, a delegation of citizens appeared and asked that some improvement be made to the Marsh Road between the One-Mile House and the Marsh Bridge. Commissioner Frink said it was his intention to have some repairs made just as soon as the work on Douglas Avenue was completed.

Bills of \$282.38 for the entertainment of the officers of the Calcutta, and \$1,260, for repairing No. 1 berth, Sand Point, were ordered paid.

Tenders for a water and air pump for the Governor's Carleton were referred to the Commissioner of Harbours as follows: St. John Iron Works, \$1,390; Worthington Pump and Machinery Corporation, \$1,100.

Tenders for the painting of No. 4 Engine House were opened as follows: James Huey, \$500; W. E. Demings, \$250. They were referred to the Commissioner of Safety.

It was decided to have either Mayor Schofield or Commissioner Frink attend the meeting of the Union of Canadian Municipalities.

Engineer Hatfield reported on the rock on the Shamrock Grounds and suggested that a right of way be obtained from Armstrong & Bruce to cross their land when hauling it to the city. Let to the Mayor, Commissioner of Public Works and the Engineer.

Commissioner Jones reported that it would cost about \$16,680 to make water and sewer connections with the vacant lots on Douglas Avenue.

On motion of Commissioner Jones, seconded by Commissioner Thornton, it was decided to approach the Government on the matter of a division of the money received from amusement and automobile taxes from this city.

William Pirie asked permission to install a gasoline tank in front of his premises, 42 Sydney street. The matter was referred to the Commissioner of Public Safety.


