York, Oct. 1.—A rainstorm that almost clouded the afternoon and evening in New York this morning had a record precipitation falling in the city streets, tied up the subway, flooded elevated traffic and caused property loss that can only be estimated tonight.

THE WOMAN'S CORNER

Efficient Housekeeping

Good living and deep thinking have ever gone hand in hand. A way with this blooded philosophy with faces set against things to eat. Benjamin Franklin said "You cannot get blood from a turnip" after he had given vegetarianism a fair trial, and returned to his mutton and the ripe old age that he enjoyed he attributed to portershouse steaks and their delicate accompaniments.

Other recipes from the cook book of famous families are the following:
Queen Victoria's potatoe & is Rehe.
One quart of rich chicken stock, freed from fat, season highly with onion, salt and pepper. Crush the yolks of three hard boiled eggs and mix them with a half a cup of rolled sifted cracker crumbs. Chop the breast meat of the boiled fowl until it is a soft paste and add it to the egg and cracker mixture.

Mark Twain's famous potatoe fluff: Use about four medium sized mackerel or a three-pound catfish. Remove the flesh from them without cooking; pick out the bones and pick the pieces of meat in layers with the spices and oil. Add a pint of cream and then press all through a sieve into the hot soup. Add one-half a cup of salt and an equal quantity of whole spices—cloves, peppercorns and allspice in equal proportions. Pack in an unglazed stoneware jar (as the vinegar destroys the glass) cover closely with a snug fitting lid and keep in a cool cellar or refrigerator. This is a splendid relish.

A promising novelty for dressy afternoon and evening wear the low beretta crown is completed by a double "milkmaid" brim of velvet, or a brim of Chantilly lace. This in effect is a moderately large hat with draped crown and soft brim of velvet, completed by a second brim section, which is made of rich velvet or silk. The combination of velvet is as effective as it is popular, and is made use of in millinery wherever possible.

A decided novelty of the season is the hat with wide brim, rather than the old-fashioned, brim—an echo of the hat for Cubist effects. This brim may be either flat or turned up at the corners and is known in all millineries as the "hat of the future." It is a hat that will be worn in the future, no doubt.

HOUSEHOLD HINTS

To keep white gloves clean in a muff, have an adjustable lining of white silk or satin that may be fastened in over the back lining of the muff with invisible tucks and loops.

THE CHAFING DISH

After the plain boiled corn I think corn oysters the most delicate. Cut thick from six ears and add one egg. Beat with mixer beater until light and add salt to taste. Two tablespoons of sweet milk. Into one-half cup of four sift one-fourth teaspoon of baking powder. Stir into corn mixture. This mixture can be served in a buttered toast ring or a teaspoon into hot boiling fat, fry delicate brown.
