He also talked about \$5 billion being set aside for Alsands. He knows that that was a bail-out, last gasp attempt by the Minister of Energy, Mines and Resources (Mr. Lalonde) to salvage that project. In fact, Mr. Speaker, the Alsands project would have gone ahead. There would have been 30,000 more jobs in Canada today and a lot greater confidence in the future of our economy. We would be much closer to achieving energy self-sufficiency if he had not voted against the government at that time.

An hon. Member: Right on!

Mr. Siddon: If he wants \$2 billion in tax cuts now, he should remember the more than \$2 billion in tax credits and incentives, including an energy tax credit for low-income Canadians that he and his party voted against in December of 1979. So, Mr. Speaker, I say a pox on both their houses.

Mr. Blais: You never introduced the legislation. We did not vote against it.

Mr. Siddon: They have not addressed the fundamental problems of our economy. We are converting investment and confidence in this country into debt and despair. We have seen over \$18 billion of tax revenue leave Canada for the United States.
