There is one bright spot in whole business to date and th the announcement of President I Brown that many small firms settled and the men are back to and the announcement of I Kirwin of the marine trades feign that the Dominion Shippi ing Company has introduced eight-hour day.
To-day a special committee of metal trades council is meeting the executive council of the ti and labor council with a view making plans to cover the w province of Ontario, in a move for an eight-hour day in support the striking metal trades. It also take the form of a Dominion-movement as well. The exact council of the trades council was g full power at last Thursday's mee to go ahead. The plans will in the idea of a provincial-wide stri.

Belgium Dissatisfied With Peace Treaty

PREMIER ARRIVES AT PARIS WITH PROTEST FROM BELGIAN SENATE.
PARIS, May 2.—The Belgian d gation to the peace conference is pressing dissatisfaction over the te of the preliminaries for peace as t affect Belgium. None of the terric claims of Belgium have been gra except that for Malmedy, in the Prussia, a short distance south of La Chapelle, the population of w before the war was largely Wall. Malmedy will revert to Belgium. territory on the left bank of the Sch river and Maasrict and the I bourg peninsula are not mentione the terms.
Financial Terms.
Of the \$500,000,000 already ment ed as an immediate financial indem for Belgium, more than half the amo has merely been placed to Belgiu credit in allied countries as part payment of war loans. No provi has been made for the recall by many of the six billion marks w were left in Belgium and now are ly in Belgian banks and vaults, bearing interest and unproductive as the culation of the mark in Belgium is permitted.
"The amount of six billion m represents virtually the total Belg liquid wealth assets," said a mem of the Belgian delegation to-day.
M. Delacroix, the Belgian prem arrived in Paris this morning bring a message of protest from the Belg Senate. He conferred with M. J mans, of the Belgian peace delegat who is expected to appear before
