feasibility of euthanasia was placed before the Hawaiian State Legislature in 1972, the preamble to the bill stated that since Hawaii has shown that it has already taken control of men's destiny through its abortion laws (Hawaii has the widest, abortion laws in the the United States) there would appear to be no reason why it should not consider euthanasia.

It is not without a significance that three leading proponents of abortion in the United States are also members of the Euthanasia Society of America.

Touby apparently does not know that wide abortion laws

do not cut down the number of criminal abortions. According to a report issued in February, 1972, by the Royal College of Obstetricians and Gynaecologists in Britain, there was little or no decrease in the number of criminal abortions in Britain since their wide abortion act came into effect in 1967. the number of actual deaths of women due to abortions has increased since the abortion law was widened here in August, 1969.
