How to cut Pineapples-A Florida fruit grower states that the natives of the pineapple district never think of cutting a pincapple across. They pare it, cut it lengthwise, slice it or not, and, with the trimmed crown as a handle, eat it much as a New Englander does his corn, rejecting the core. This, the writer says, not only improves the flavor, but lessens the strings of fibre that get in the teeth.

German Salad Dressing-Rub the volks of two hard boiled eggs in a basin till smooth, Add two raw egg yolks, one at a time, work well together and stir in slowly four table-spoonfuls of olive oil. Add half a teaspoonful of made mustard and work'in four more tablespoonfuls of oil, and when thoroughly mixed, put in two tablespoonfuls of tarracon vinegar and black pepper and salt to taste. This is also an excellent sauce for cold, cooked vegetables.

An Appetizing salad-Take a half a new cabbage; remove the outside leaves and cut out the heart; then with a very thin bladed sharp knife, shred the cabbage fine as chrysanthemum long green pappers; remove stems and seeds and shred them with the knife as fine as the cabbage. Lightly with the knife as fine as the cabbage. Lightly mix the peppers with the cabbage; put it in a large salad bowl, make a plain salad dressing and pour it over the whole

Chelsea Buns-Tr a pound of dough ad three ounces of buiter, four ounces of currants, washed and dried, four ounces of sugar, two eggs and a few pieces of candied peel. Let all rise for two hours; then divide into six pieces which should be rolled into long, round strips. Roll these round in a circle squaring by degrees, lay them on a floured baking sheet, and set near the fire to rise. When they have almost doubled in size, bake in a good oven, and when nearly done, brush with beaten egg and strew over with confectionery augar,

Southern Corn Pudding -Score the corn down the centre of each row, of grains, then with the back of the knife press out the pulp. To each pint and a half of this pulp allow four eggs, a pint of milk, a teaspoonful of salt and a dash of black pepper. Separate the eggs and beat until light, add the yolks the corn, then the milk, salt and pepper; mix and then s ir in carefully ell-beaten whites. Brush a pudding dish lightly with butter, pour in the mixture and bake slowly one hour.

An excellent accompaniment to Boiled Mackerel with Sauce - Remove the fins, split open, dress an livemove the backbone of he fish and brush over with melied butter or oil. Cook in a well-oiled broiler over a slow fire and dish on a hot platter with a platform of mashed potato shaped to the fish. Spread over the fish a partly melted maitre d'hotel sauce made as follows. Cream three tablespoonfuls of butter and add one tablespoonful of cress or parsley finely chopped, an I wrung dry in a cloth. Put a few grains of pepper and salt and one or two ablespoonfuls of lemon juice. Garnish the fish with lettuce and slices of lemon and serve

sliced dressed cucumbers. French Lamb Cutlets-Cat a loin of lamb into chops, remove all the fat, trim them, scrape the bones and lay them in a deep dish. Cover with salad oil and let them remain an hour. Mix together finely grated bread crumbs, a little minced parsley, pepper, salt and some grated nutmeg. Drain the cutlets from the oil, cover them with the mixture and broil them over a bed of live hot coals on a heated gridiron, the bars of which have been rubbed with chalk. The cutlets must be thoroughly cooked and turned often. Have ready some boiled potatoes, mashed smoothly and stiff with cream or butter. Heap the mashed potato high in a heated dish, shape t like a dome and smooth it with a spoon, and around its base stand the cutlets. On the point of the dome place a bunch of curled parsley.

Bluefish-There are no better fish in market that bluefish. They may be obtained absolutely fresh in the markets. Small bluefish are best for broiling andl arge ones for baking. Broiled bluefish, with maitre d'hotel sauce are delicate and delicious. Have them split for broiling at the market; rinse them well in cold water; then dry the fish well on a piece of chees cloth; put it on a broiler which has been well rubbed with butter ; then rub the fish well with melted butter, lay the skin side hext (the Ears of the broiler, and slap it under inggas ilame blue side up. Let it broil till brown; then season with salt; turn it over and broil on minute on the other side. Lay it on a hol platter, skin down, garnish it with parsley and quarters of lemon, and pour the mattre d'hotel sauce over the fish.

To make the sauce put a tablespoonful of butter in a dish, squeeze in the juice of a big leren addia table-spoonful of chopped pursiey; stand the cup where the butter will melt; then the sauce is ready for use.

To make lining for stoves or fireplaces, take 'six parts in bulk o'l common potter's clay, one part of plaster of paris and one part wood ashes. Mix this together with water to form a thick cement, which must be spr ad thickly and smoothly in the clace where the lining is needed. Fire may be made in the stove in a few hours. If, in a day or two, cracks appear fill em up with fresh cement made in the
