The remodeling of an old house sometimes makes the intro-duction of a window heat practicable. action of a window heat practicable.

Window seats, notwithstanding their popular appreciation, are rarely overdone. One may call to mind single rooms where the window sent contributed to the attraction, but the house is still to be built that is rendered distinctive throughout this feature. Window seats are disappointing when they are not properly located and when their construction is not rightly understood. A window seat in an entrance hall where no one sits and where it receives only casual attention is prac-tically wasted. Formal rooms of the house make no especial claim for the window seat, but its presence in the living rooms is a means for securing cozy, inviting looking interiors. The best situation for the window seat must be a question for individual decision. The dining room has probably the most urgent claim when it is much in demand for afternoon or evening entertainment, and the picturesque quality of the window seat is always welcome among the conventional fur-

nishings of this apartment.

Brick houses with walls eighteen or more inches deep offer the simplest so-lution to the making of window seats, out with walls of ordinary thickness good effects can be made by projecting a casement window outside of the run-ning wall. This has been done, as in the illustration, where the window and seat combine with the fireplace to make a charming living room. Sometimes an uneven line of wall or a "jog" invites the introduction of a window seat, and the arrangement is made



about satisfactory if it is inclosed like a box. In a bedroom a window box of this description is always available for storing unused underwear or shirt waists or extra bedding. In a living room it can always be utilized as a stowaway for articles that must be kept at hand, but out of sight.

In the construction of the window seat the primary consideration is the height. With a cushion laid over the top of the seat the distance from the moor should be less than if it is left uncovered.
