GOES ON

Dover Township Closed Satisfactory Agreement With the Radial Railroad Company.

The Council of Dover and the Electric Railroad Company have come to satisfactory agreement, which was settled apon and finally passed yesterday and the agreement to carry t out was closed this morning.

The by-law provides that the rail-road shall keep off the graded part of the town line except between the second and third concessions, where it is impossible, owing to the houses and shade trees, to construct the road on the right side of the ditch. There the railroad company is allowto build up and protect the side of the ditch on the highway and run the road upon the graded part so long as they can and do leave 25 feet in width of good highway for the pub-

The Railroad Co. makes and maintains all ditches and culverts in the course of its road, and subjects itself to the ditches and watercourse and drainage acts without comes seif to the ditches and watercourse and drainage acts, without compelling recourse to the railroad commission in the event of it being necessary to put a drain under the brack.

The Railroad Co. further agrees to cross the townline at the 13th concession and go upon the Chatham township side of the highway ditch, so as not to interfere with the narrow grade of the townline, where the ditches occupy a large part of the road allowance. The township exempts the Railroad from the general taxes but not from ditch or school tax.

The Railroad Co. is required to give a good service and run not less than three electric gars each way each day. The Co. bears all costs and expenses connected with the special meetings of the Council, preparing of by laws and agreements, and the procuring of legislation to validate the by-laws.
