A new station, the raising of tracks, extension of yards, and building of subways are included in the scheme.—The County Council last week approved of the good roads scheme and will spend \$0,000 this year. The Sylvan bridge will be built.—A. O. Graydon, City Engineer, will receive tenders up to 4 p. m. February 1st for cement sidewalks, cement curb and gutter, lumber, gravel, stone, glazed tile, concrete tile, Portland cement, iron castings, etc.

VANCOUVER, B. E. Hewson, of Amherst, N.S.; estimated cost, \$40,000.

OTTAWA, ONT.—E. L. Horwood, architect, is preparing plans for a five-storey brick building to be erected on corner of Bank and Queen streets by J. C. Brennan, stores on the ground floor and offices above, cost about \$65,000.
