Mr. Ricards' Proposition Rejected. A meeting of the stockholders of the

Josie Gold Mining company, limited. was held in its office in this city last evening. The meeting lasted from 8 p.m. till 10 o'clock, and the matter principally under consideration was the offer made by Thomas Ricards, the Engish mining expert, to purchase the property. The matter was debated at ength, and the decision was arrived at that the Ricard proposition be rejected. The officers of the company stated that the work on the property would proceed as usual and that there would be no change of any character in the management. The proposition, in brief, by Mr. Ricard was to pay the stockholders \$50,-000 in cash and 40 per cent of the stock in the new company, which was to be formed to operate the mine. It was proposed that \$200,000 in cash be placed in the treasury of the new company, to be used in the development of the mine. The new company was to have a capital-ization of 200,000 £1 shares. The present shareholders in the Josie were to receive

500,000 shares of a par value of \$500,000.
