

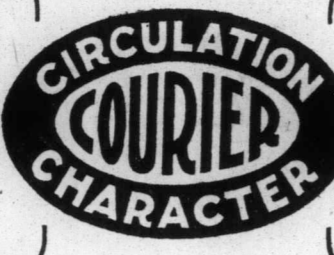

## CANADIAN CASUALTIES

FILLED IN ACTION. Galt—Pte. W. B. Coulthard, Stratford—Pte. Roy Silliant. WOUNDED. Stratford—Pte. Oscar Schultz; Pte. Thomas Walsh. SERIOUSLY ILL. Woodstock—Pte. Michael Smith. Two Western Ontario men are reported killed in action in the latest casualty lists. A Stratford soldier has given his life for his country, and two others of the city are among the newly wounded.

Dangerously Wounded. Wingham, April 10.—Mrs. Elizabeth Atcheson, of this town, received word yesterday by telegram from Ottawa that her son, Wallace, of the 161st Battalion, which left here last fall, is officially reported dangerously wounded, in being sent to Clearing Station, April 6, in France, this being the second casualty in the family, another son, Locke, being killed some months ago in France, and a third and last son, Lorne, is on his way to England. Much sympathy is extended from the people of Wingham to the bereaved widow.

Stratford Casualties. Stratford, April 10.—Official telegrams yesterday morning, brought news of three local casualties. Pte. Roy Silliant, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Silliant, was killed in action on March 26. Pte. Oscar Schultz, whose parents reside at 21 Stratford street, is in a hospital at Etaples, severely wounded in the left arm, and Pte. Thomas Walsh was wounded on March 17, but is able to remain on duty. Pte. Silliant enlisted in the 71st Battalion, being at the time employed at the brick works in the G. T. R. shops. He had just passed his 22nd birthday. His brother, Pte. W. C. Silliant, is being invalided home.

Galt Boy Falls. Galt, April 10.—Pte. Wm. Bailey Coulthard, formerly of Col. Clarke's South Waterloo Battalion, was reported killed in action on March 29 in a message to his widowed mother, Mrs. W. Coulthard, 20 Rose street, yesterday morning. He had been at the front only since the beginning of the year. He was in his 25th year, and was born and raised here and had spent all his life in Galt. A tinmith by trade, he was employed at Sheldon's Limited, before enlisting. Besides his mother, two sisters, Mrs. J. Kaiser, of Welland, and Miss Annie, of Galt, survive.

Seriously Ill. Woodstock, April 10.—Pte. Michael Smith, who went to England with the 168th Battalion, was reported seriously ill in an official telegram received by his mother today.

The British Ministry of Labor, in conjunction with the War Pensions Statutory Committee, is establishing trade and market study committees to advise concerning the training and employment of disabled soldiers.

**Stronger**  
WINTER AGAIN IN GERMANY  
Cold Weather Holds Swabia During the Easter Holidays  
HEAVY SNOWFALL Throughout the Empire  
May Add to Food Troubles  
SWEDEN IS NEUTRAL  
And Will Represent Austria in U. S.

Copenhagen, via London, April 10.—The Easter holidays in Germany were marked, according to reports in the German newspapers, by a return of winter weather over a large part of the empire, an occurrence of considerable importance in connection with the prospects for the next harvest.

Particularly sharp drops in temperature were reported in East Prussia, West Prussia, Posen and Upper Silesia, comprising the important grain-growing regions of Germany. Heavy snow fell at various points.

Before this development, the agricultural papers had complained of the effects of the severe and protracted winter. The winter grain crop was several weeks behind its normal development, although it is declared that the proportion requiring reaping was comparatively small. Farmers were unable to commence their spring planting and it seems certain that the new delay will materially defer the fall harvest of all food crops.

The net result is that there will be increasing difficulty in carrying over until the harvest on the scanty reserve of stock, even if the harvest itself is affected in quality.

Peace Wanted.  
Amsterdam, April 11.—via London—Theodor Wolff, discussing in The Berlin Tageblatt, the Emperor's expressed hope of a speedy peace, asks how soon the Russian people will be ready to lay down their arms. He says:  
"To the Petrograd intellectuals America's war declaration may act as a stimulant, in the country the Russian farmer is looking at his fields and not across the ocean. There is no symptom of a willingness for peace in the western nations, where America's declaration naturally has a stronger effect than in Russian homesteads."

On the question of suffrage reform Herr Wolff regrets the postponement and urges various internal reforms.

Sweden Neutral.  
Stockholm, via London, April 11.—Foreign Minister Lindman has handed to United States Ambassador Morris a formal notice by the Swedish Government that it intends to preserve strict neutrality between America and Germany and for this purpose renews and reiterates the declaration of neutrality issued at the outbreak of the war.

The Swedish government accepted Austria-Hungary's request to take over diplomatic representation of the dual monarchy in Washington.

**Weather Bulletin**  
Toronto, April 11.—The eastern disturbance is dispersing over the Maritime provinces and another of less intensity is moving across the great lakes. The temperature is now rising in Ontario, but remains low in Quebec and eastern Canada.
