About one thirty this afternoon Geo. TAKEN TO FORKS

Miner Found in Semi-Unconscious State

RIVER RISING VERY RAPIDLY

Water Comes Up 13 Inches in 24 Hours

Klondike Making Opening Across Yukon in Front Territorial Court House.

A miner of King Solomon's bill, William Benedict by name, was taken to the Forks on Wednesday evening in a semi-unconscious condition.

Thirteen inches of a rise in the water of the Yukon river is the record for the 24 hours preceding 12 o'clock today. Up to yesterday the river had risen 16 inches since the preceding Saturday, and the 13 inch rise of yesterday and today made an elevation of 29 inches for the week.

THE GUSHER IS GUSHING

Ice Thawed From Pipes in the Shaft

Water Will Piped to Supply the People of Bonanza City.

The Eldorado gusher will very shortly be turned into a source of profit to its owners. The pipes which were used in capping the underground stream have been thawed out and a full splice head of clear crystal water is now available for any purposes that may be desired.

It is the immediate intention to pipe the water to the town of Bonanza where it will be supplied to all stores and dwellings.

Heretofore the people at the Forks have been forced to rely upon surface springs in the vicinity, the water of which has not always been of the purest nature.

TERRITORIAL COURT

Members of Bench to Sit in Appeals Monday and Tuesday

Valdez Railroad.

Seattle, April 14.—A. B. Iles and Portland capitalists are said to be back of the Valdez, Copper River & Tanana Railroad Company, to which the citizens of Valdez, as announced recently, have subscribed \$75,000 in cash for the construction of a steel highway from Valdez, on the seaboard, to the American Yukon, by way of the new Tanana diggings.

Valdez is said to be much disturbed because of the activity of the Alaska Central Railroad Company, which purposes building a road from Seward, on Resurrection bay, by way of the Tanana, to Rampart City, on the Yukon. It is pointed out that the construction of the Alaska Central would retard the building of a road from Valdez. In any event, it is claimed the road first in that field would hold the bulk of traffic.

Iles has been operating in the Copper river valley for several years. He is heavily interested in both copper and placer gold mines. When he submitted his proposition to the people of Valdez it was on the basis of their subscribing a \$50,000 or \$75,000 bond to his road, a certain sum of money to be paid with the completion of every five miles of railway.
