A SLICK BIT OF WORK

THE SHARP TRICK THAT WAS PULLED OFF BY A REPORTER.

A Case in Which an Alert and Resourceful Newspaper Man Managed to Outwit a Gathering of Shrewd Politicians.

"One of the sharpest bits of newspaper work in my recollection," said one of the New York correspondents when the subject of getting news under difficulties came up, "was pulled off by a New York political reporter during the snap convention excitement in New York in 1892. They were so busily engaged in talking that the politician didn't notice which gate they went through to take the train. They got aboard the Boston express, which only hesitates a few times on the way to the town of beans, the first stop being at New Haven. The politician was blissfully ignorant of the destination of the train and figured that he was on a local bound for White Plains. When the brakeman sung out "All aboard!" the politician reporter said to the politician, "Excuse me a minute; I want to go up forward to see if there's a boy with the afternoon papers on the train. Just as the train was pulling out he hopped off. Shabby trick?"

"The politician's life is a warfare," said the Murray Hill meeting was called for 7 o'clock. About 50 of the most prominent Cleveland men in the state and city of New York were on hand, and they were solemnly ushered into the parlor where the meeting took place. They had to pass all kinds of guards and doorkeepers and sergeants-at-arms, but the newspaper man got through without any trouble. He was simply stunning, and he used some of the make up to increase the resemblance. He took a seat in the rear, and he didn't miss a trick. The politician reporter pledged not to give a single detail of the meeting to the newspaper men first of all, and then the business went forward. Just when the meeting was about to adjourn the sergeant-at-arms handed a telegram to Mr. Whitney, the chairman of the meeting.

"The newspaper man correctly figured that it was from the politician who had been speeding on his way to Boston. He quietly rose, picked up his hat and walked out the rear door, nobody suspecting anything. We had no means of ascertaining what a bombshell the missing politician's telegram threw into the crowd, but we did learn later that it was from him that he told in it of the job that had been put up on him."

"We adjourned in cabs to another hotel, and there the political reporter who had sat throughout the antisappers' meeting gave us all of the details. He had a remarkable memory, and he had the whole thing down pat in addition to a manifold copy of the resolutions which had been passed, with which each man at the meeting had been furnished. He could have written the thing up himself and scored a clean scoop on the town, but he passed his pickings over to all of us, which was a pretty generous thing in itself, for we'd all have been in trouble with our papers had we been beaten on the thing. Every morning paper in New York had four columns on the first page the next morning about the antisappers' meeting, resolutions and all. I saw Mr. Whitney a few days later, and I couldn't refrain from grinning a bit."

SHUT UP THE MILL.

Silk Factory Was Started to Make a Man of the Fiend Who slew Miss Hoeschster.

New York, Nov. 2.—Because his son Walter is in jail, charged with the murder of Jennie Hoeschster, the Patterson mill hand, James McAllister has shut down his silk plant in that city. All the employees have been paid off and the works are closed.

McAllister started the mill about six years ago for the benefit of Walter. It was the desire to give his son a chance to succeed in business and build up a first class plant. Walter was manager, and although the firm was known as James McAllister & Co., he was at the head of the mill. About 60 persons were employed.

Business was good until two weeks ago, or until Walter was arrested on the charge of murder. The father had the mills all run off and then closed the mill and paid off the employees.

PRESS PROTESTS

Against the Appointment of Lord Lansdowne

As Foreign Secretary—Says he is Not Fit for the Office.

London, November 1.—If the Daily Telegraph's announcement had been a mere feeler to ascertain the temper of the public toward Lord Lansdowne's appointment, he would certainly never become minister of foreign affairs; but, although the appointment to the secretaryship has not yet been confirmed it is accepted on all sides as a settled thing.

The standard, which says it has learned that Lord Salisbury, under secretary of state for the colonies, and Viscount John Brodick, under secretary of state for foreign affairs, will enter the cabinet and that Chas. Thomson Ritchie, president of the board of trade, will be given a higher post, says:

"The appointment of the Marquis of Lansdowne to be Her Majesty's principal secretary of state for foreign affairs is an almost inconceivable blunder. He has neither the character, qualifications nor experience for such a post. The only plausible excuse for the appointment is that Lord Salisbury will still control the foreign office, while Lord Lansdowne relieves him of his routine duties."

The Daily Mail, which professes to be unable to believe that such an appointment is possible, says:

"If Lord Lansdowne is appointed foreign secretary and some other gentleman of agreeable manners is made first lord of the admiralty, the country may lament a great opportunity lost forever."

The Daily Chronicle says:

"We must wonder whether the country would have voted quite so 'khaki' had it known of this appointment beforehand."

The Daily News observes:

"Presumably the explanation of the appointment is that Lord Salisbury wants a man he can easily control in foreign affairs, which would have been impossible if Mr. Chamberlain had been appointed. In fact, Lord Salisbury will still be the foreign minister with Lord Lansdowne as his clerk."

The Times, in a similar extent, takes the view of the Liberal organs, namely, that Lord Salisbury will now find time to be the real premier, and to exercise greater control over the whole cabinet, instead of a mere nominal control. It believes the report of Lansdowne's appointment correct and defends him against newspaper attacks, saying: "The critics would find it hard to indicate whom they consider better fitted for the post."

After naming several rather negative qualifications for the post, the Times says it thinks it ungenerous to criticize until the country has seen whether the new minister will accept.

What the Baby Looks Like.

Nothing is more remarkable than a comparison of the same-sized profile views of the same person at six and at thirty years of age; the growth of the forehead are so great that the jaws appear to have diminished in size; and this is really what the jaws have done, in proportion to the whole face.

It is a good delusion with visitors and nurses that the baby is just like its father or mother. No one who has had that scientific training necessary to proper observation could make such a statement. It is a gross libel, sometimes, on the baby, sometimes on the parents. Properly taken photographs show that the proportions of nearly every feature in the face of a baby and an adult are entirely different; but the greatest difference exists in the size and shape of the nose and size of the jaws. If, when adult, we had features like our babies, we should have a countenance of a negro type. Except positive evidence be available, it would hardly be creditable that the most educated, least prominent-nosed individual, with high forehead, was in babyhood prognathous, short and snub-nosed, with a remarkably receding forehead. The difference resulting from the change during life as shown by two photographs reduced to the same size, not the same proportion, is greater than the difference between many species; yet the very fact of such metabolism and the possibility of its earlier transmission from generation to generation may be the basis of specific mutation, without calling in the aid of natural, or sexual, or physiological selection to account for that phenomenon.

The prognathism of a child is less noticeable than it should be, because such prognathism, owing to the disposition of weight, alters the whole carriage of the head; and the difference in the method of carrying the head obscures the prognathism to a certain extent.—S. S. Buckman in Popular Science Monthly.
