MR. WHITE IS QUITE PROUD

And Well He May Be After His Last Fat Man's Race

Mt. Clemens Leader Gives Graphic Account of the Grand Event

The Mt. Clemens Leader of August 2, contains the following account of the foot race, in which Chatham's famous fat man figured so prominently:

"An impromptu sporting event was pulled off at 8 o'clock this morning on Crocker boulevard that attracted more people than many heralded by posters and trumpets.

"At an early hour an unusual number of people were noticed crossing Macomb street bridge and it was soon rumored about that a foot race was to be run between two guests at the Sherman House to decide a wager. Others joined the crowd and soon several hundred people were lined up along the avenue opposite the ball park waiting the arrival of the contestants who soon appeared in special conveyances with their backers and stripped for the fray. They were J. W. White, barrister, of Chatham, Ont., also ex-champion amateur sprinter, of Canada, who tipped the beam at 200 pounds, and Tom Burgen, who sells liquor dealer, of Columbus, Ohio, ex-ball player and all-round athlete. A course of 65 yards was measured off and at the signal by Starter J. J. Jenkins, an oil magnate of Corna, Ohio, the old time sports were off like a shot. It was nip and tuck for the first half of the stretch, but in the last half White got the lead and passed the home stake fifteen feet ahead of his opponent.

"The judges were W. J. Watts, of Columbus, Ohio, and Charles Parzts, of Chicago. Considerable money was up in the race and it furnished much amusement for a large number of hotel guests.

"It is said that Mr. White, who is quite proud of his victories on the field of sport, was somewhat nettled by remarks claimed to have been made by Mr. Burgen that he was the only Simon pure ex-champion sprinter in the city and issued a challenge, which was immediately accepted by the latter."

SUICIDE NEAR TORONTO?

Mysterious Message Received From Missing Man, Native of Erie.

Erie, Pa., Aug. 5.—Through the aid of the postoffice officials of Toronto, Canada, the local police officials have succeeded in clearing up the mystery of the disappearance of a prominent man.

It is now thought that John McCall committed suicide near Toronto, although no clue to his whereabouts was disclosed until Postmaster Sobel of the Erie postoffice received a card from Toronto, which bore these words, "Committed suicide; if you find it, send word to my mother that I am dead.—McCall, Erie, Pa."

This note was written on the back of a ticket of a Toronto theatre. The card was found on Toronto Island. McCall disappeared some time ago, and the police notified his parents yesterday of his death, although no foundation as to whether the body was found or not has been received.

Fatality at Cobalt.

Cobalt, Ont., Aug. 5.—Alexander McIsaac, a machanic on the Tom-Jakanning & Hudson Bay mine, was killed Saturday morning by falling down the shaft.

He had just come to the top in the bucket with another employe, and it is supposed he slipped when stepping out of the bucket. He dropped 10 feet. When picked up by the foreman he spoke, but expired immediately after.

McIsaac came from Dartmouth, N.S., where his sister resides. His father and mother are also living at Halifax. He was about 40 years of age, a widower, and belonged to the Cobalt Miners' Union. His son died last spring in Nova Scotia.
