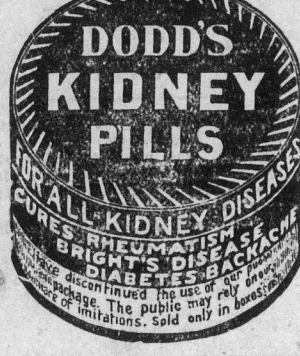

BIG SHIPS IN COLLISION.
2,300 Immigrants On the Rhein Are Thrown Into a Panic.
New York, May 14.—A slight collision between the North German Lloyd liner Rhein and the British steamer Evelyn occurred Saturday in the harbor during a heavy fog. Several dents were made in the iron plates on the sides of both vessels, but no serious damage was apparent.
Over 2,300 immigrants on the Rhein became wild with fear when the scraping noises began, and their screams were heard for a long distance through the fog.

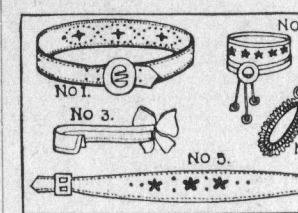
Some Dainty Washable Embroidered Belts For the Summer Girl.

Here are two pretty styles in embroidered washable belts, which are the most practical as well as the most popular belts for wear with the shirt waist suit.

Both of these belts are finished with mother-of-pearl buckles and so constructed that they may be removed from the buckle and laundered without the slightest difficulty.

Fig. 2 shows a pretty stock of embroidered linen, with bands of pale blue ribbon brought from the back and passing through a small pearl buckle at the front. The ends, hanging below the buckle, are each run through a still smaller buckle.

Fig. 3 shows a new "hunch" for the ever popular turnover collar. Many

To Use Cold Meat.
What to do with cold roast meats is often a problem. Cold lamb is excellent when served in aspic jelly. Make the jelly—er buy it, which is easier and nearly as good every way—and pour a little in the bottom of a mold. Cut the lamb in thin slices of uniform size and trim them neatly. When the layer of jelly is hard arrange the slices with layers of jelly and pour jelly in last of all. When the dish is quite firm unmold and decorate with small olives, truffles, capers or pimientos and garnish with water cress.
