A CRISIS HAS ARRIVED

Grand Commander of the Mac-cabees on Fraternal Insurance.

Cold Business Methods Responsible For Fraternal Societies Failure—Only Field For a Fraternal Benefit Society is to Mix Fraternity With Business—Only Upon Old Line Methods Can Speculative Insurance Be Had.

Detroit, Jan. 20.—"A crisis has arrived in the affairs of fraternal organizations and it has been brought about by the societies being converted into quasi old line insurance companies. When the fraternal feeling disappears and cold business methods take its place, the fraternal benefit societies must go down, for fraternal societies, barring difference in expense of administration, cannot issue insurance at any less than the old line companies. With the possibilities of had selections, it is apt to be more. There is an end to everything, and we must not expect our societies to be perpetual. Only when a man can perpetuate himself can he expect to perpetuate an organization such as an order."

Uttered in characteristic style by Major N. S. Boynton of Port Huron, grand commander of the Knights of the Modern Macabees, and one of the best-known fraternal insurance men in America, the above remarks dropped like a bombshell into the annual meeting of the Michigan Fraternal Congress, in session at the Hotel Cadillac. He followed Rev. W. Wayne Wilson of Detroit, prominently identified with the A.O.U.W. of Michigan, who had protested that there must be rates adequate to meet all contracts at the time specified, requiring a solid money which at compound interest would meet the policy at the expiration.

"You must get the 2 plus 2 from the members in order to have the 4 to pay back to them, or else you will meet dissatisfaction and disorder," said Mr. Wilson.

"What we have to expect is fraternal co-operation, not fraternal insurance," maintained Major Boynton. "You want blood-letting. My method is milder and, therefore, my method is milder. The only field for a fraternal benefit society is to mix fraternity with business. If you get too much commercialism, the young men will go to the old line orders. If you get too much fraternalism, the confounded craft hops over. But we don't have the fraternalism we had 25 years ago and the orders are weaker for it."

"Fraternal insurance will carry a man over the line when he most needs insurance. If the organization which I have devoted years in helping to build up should go out of business to-morrow I should be satisfied with it for the good it has done. If you are going to speculate upon, you have got to do it on the basis of the old line companies."

FOUR WEEKS ON DESOLATE REEF

Wreck Off B. C. Coast In Which Seven Lives Were Lost.

Victoria, B. C., Jan. 20.—Meagre details of the wreck of the ship King David, on Dec. 13, have been received. Daring a terrible gale, the ship was driven ashore on the west coast of Vancouver Island, near Kootka. The mate and six of the crew were drowned.

The remainder were for four weeks marooned on a desolate reef, sustaining life by eating the ship's stores, and by fishing. The weather was severe and all suffered severely.

They were rescued by the coasting steamer Queen City and reached Clayquinet yesterday.

PRINCE ARTHUR'S VISIT.

Will Arrive in Victoria March 28—Will See Our Parliament.

Ottawa, Jan. 20.—Prince Arthur of Connaught, after visiting Japan, is expected to arrive at Victoria on March 28. From there the party will proceed to Vancouver, stopping at Banff and Winnipeg en route for Toronto. When Ottawa is reached Parliament will be in session. They will stay two or three days here. Prince Arthur will be the guest of Lord Grey during the time he is at the capital. The next stop will be at Montreal, afterwards Quebec, and then on to Halifax.

The Deer Slaughter.

Toronto, Jan. 20.—In reporting to the chief game warden the express companies say they carried 3,310 deer carcasses during the last shooting season, being 270 more than in the former year. They also carried 150 moose heads, a larger number than in 1904. This number of deer does not represent more than a fourth of the deer killed.

Big Towing Bill.

London, Jan. 20.—The Admiralty Court has awarded the British tank steamer Lucigen \$25,000 for service rendered in September last in towing to Halifax the North German-Lloyd steamer Bremen, which became unmanageable by the breaking of a shaft while on a voyage from New York to Bremen.

The Laurier Banquet.

Toronto, Jan. 20.—The Laurier banquet committee held a short session yesterday afternoon. Letters were read from all parts of the province asking for seats for the banquet. The program has not yet been arranged, but a great number of prominent speakers are expected.

Bank President Sentenced.

Philadelphia, Jan. 19.—Henry Lear, former president of the Doylestown National Bank, which failed several years ago, was sentenced to five years' imprisonment in the Eastern Penitentiary for embezzling the funds of the bank.

One Criminal Haven Less.

Lima, Peru, Jan. 20.—An extradition treaty between Peru and Great Britain has been concluded.
