The apples were the Kings variety and the trees over 30 years old but in common this season throughout this district were not at all heavily laden, averaging only about two barrels per tree. When the noon hour arrived he had picked clean eleven trees, securing 22 bushels of apples. Rain prevented the afternoon picking but Monday afternoon he went at the job again and at 6 o'clock had cleaned off eleven trees, securing 23 barrels of apples, thus making a total of 45 barrels for 10 hours. For this year we think this record will be hard to beat.

Change in Price of Milk

We, the undersigned licensed milk dealers of Wolfville, hereby give notice that on and after November first next our prices for milk delivered in bottles will be as follows: one quart or more, at 9 cents per quart, single pints at 5 cents. One cent less per quart where not delivered.

We wish to call attention to a few facts which will convince the consumer that the intended increase in the price will not be in proportion to the increase in the cost of production. In 1916 the price of milk was 7 cents per quart delivered. As compared with three years ago, cows, grain, mill feeds of all kinds, roots, bottles and stoppers are double the price now. Wages have increased fifty per cent. Hay is the only thing that has not increased in price, but as it is the main element in the production of milk, a variation of a few dollars per ton would make very little difference.
