



Terra Nova's Turnout

The work of discharging the cargo of the s.s. Terra Nova was finished yesterday at noon. The final statement is as follows. 16,242 young hares, 188 young hounds, 2000 beavers, 222 old hares, 90 skins damaged, total 18,851. The gross weight of the cargo is 419 tons, 4 cwt. and 19 lbs; and the net weight, 400 tons, 19 cwt. 1 qr., 8 lbs. The hares averaged 47 1-3 lbs. The crew shared \$74.68.

Young Electrician Killed at Bell Island

Walter Dwyer, 18, instantly killed by High Voltage Shock.

News reached the city from Bell Island last evening of the sad and tragic death there at 4 p.m. of Walter Dwyer, an eighteen-year-old electrician, and son of Mr. Philip Dwyer of West Wabana.

The young man was working in No. 2 Mine when, it is believed, he came into contact with a switch with the result that 6,000 volts passed thru his body, killing him instantly. Walter Dwyer was well known and especially liked on Bell Island, especially in athletic and brigade circles. He was a member of the Catholic Cadet Corps and played goal on the Cadet team during last year's football season.

AT THE CITY HALL

The weekly meeting of the Council was held yesterday afternoon. Mayor Cook presided and Councillors Marth, Outerbridge, Vincombe, Collier, Ryan and Dowden were present.

After the reading of the Minutes of last meeting, the following matters were given consideration.
A communication from the Superintendent of the General Hospital, with reference to the condition of Forest Road, was read and discussed, and the engineer was instructed to have same given attention.

W. J. Lowe applied for work of repaving Water Street pavement. This application was ordered placed on file.

F. M. Stirling, on behalf of the Select Vestry of St. Thomas's Church, called attention to the need of having a light placed at the Eastern entrance to the Church property. This will be inquired into by the Lighting Committee.

On recommendation of the Inspector General and City Engineer, George R. Parsons will be given permit to install Gasoline Tank in front of his garage, King's Road. A like application received from the Avalon Telephone Company, was deferred, pending a report from the Inspector General.

It was decided that Tenders be called for the usual supply of uniforms for the Municipal Inspectors.

PERMITS

The following were granted permits subject to the approval of the City Engineer:—

E. Lawrence, to extend garage, 23 Hayward Avenue.

J. Maunder, to bridge drain, Forest Road.

D. Leonard, for extension to dwelling, Gear Street.

M. Williams, alterations to dwelling, 44 William Street, conditional upon water and sewerage being installed.

Permit was withheld from P. Byrne, for the erection of a garage, Alexander Street, as the proposed location of the building is not satisfactory.

D. Andrews' application for permission to erect a stable at corner of King's Road and Bond Street, will be granted on the condition that he carries out the Regulations governing such buildings in the city limits, and gives a guarantee to this effect.

Tenders for the supply of horses for the Sanitary Department were received from Charles Lester, John Simmonds and Patrick Lewis. It was ordered that the Veterinary Surgeon report on the various animals offered.

CLEAN UP DAY.

The matter of a "Clean Up Day" was the subject of considerable discussion, and it was pointed out that the 21st of May could be set aside for this purpose if citizens will co-operate in the removal of garbage, etc., by placing horses and trucks at the disposal of the Council, as was done some years ago when a plan of this kind was carried out with great success.

The City Clerk will be glad to hear from any citizens, who are prepared to send horses or trucks for the assistance of the Council in this respect.

CAB AND TAXI REGULATIONS.
The Resolutions to amend the Cab and Taxi Regulations as introduced at the last Regular Meeting were taken up.

The Minister of Posts and Telegraphs, Inspector General of Constabulary, West End Candy Store, and others, protested against the proposed alterations, in view of which it was decided not to interfere with the present Regulations which are considered satisfactory and acceptable to the public generally.

Several minor matters were disposed of, and the reports of the various Departments were tabled and adopted.

After the passing of weekly accounts, the meeting adjourned.
