The leading objections in which prohibition is interested are put in upon the programme, and are introduced in turn by papers ladies representing various lines first topic on the programme Prohibition, and Mrs. Sanderson Richmond, Que., set the ball rolling reading an excellent paper in favor of general prohibition.

Dr. S.
