There has been no vulgar feature in the jubilee programme from beginning to end. No trade, no shopkeeping, no Birmingham hardware or Sheffield cutlery, no Manchester cotton. Not a moment was wasted on such trivialities as science, art and literature, in which some of the inhabitants of the globe came to Englishmen have excelled. The first of the jubilee, as an expression of the greatness and the power of the British Empire, has now been worked out to completion. If other nations have heeded the lesson, the path-way of imperial destiny must now be considered clear.

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The symbols of power were the sole components of the great triumph. Not the power of the people, of the House of Commons, or of the Constitution—what cared for these modern idealities? It was the power of the throne, manifested by these men of all colors from all corners of the earth, the Indian princes in subordinate alliance, and the colonial functionaries. In the persons of these representatives something like one-quarter of the inhabitants of the globe came to pay homage to one power, their sovereign. It was the power of the land and sea forces, exemplified in the gorgeous military display of the procession and in the marvellous show of marine fighting machines at Spithead. There were ten battleships there, of over four thousand tons and ten thousand horse-power; two cruisers of fourteen thousand tons and twenty-five thousand horse-power. Four twelve-inch and fifty-ton guns were in the armament of some of these, and the "Benbow" and the "Saxen" carried each a hundred-and-eleven-ton gun. All told, there were a hundred and sixty-six gunboats, and excluding the ships of supply and convenience, there were 135 craft built for manœuvring and fighting. Only four of the twenty-one battleships and not one of the forty-three cruisers had been built ten years ago.

With perfectly justifiable complacency England assumes that after this showing of her power not only will her colonies feel assured of her protection, but that other nations will be disposed to cultivate her friendship. They will be so disposed, and the pains they took to be duly represented at the jubilee and to join in sincere congratulations to the Queen prove that they have been so disposed in the past.

But it is not the power of the sovereign, nor the power of her armed forces, nor the length of her muster roll of subjects that makes other peoples extend the right hand of friendship to England. As others see them, particularly as we Americans see them, their just pride and their greatness springs from things which had no place in the jubilee ceremonies.

INCENDIARISM SUSPECTED.
BURNING OF A FERRY STEAMER AT NORTH SYDNEY.

NORTH SYDNEY, July 8.—The steamboat Hygeia, plying as a ferry boat between North Sydney and Sydney, was burned to the water's edge this morning at three o'clock. It is understood there is no insurance whatever. It was at first supposed the fire was accidental, but it has been reported a man was seen on the wharf at the time the fire started, who in reply to an alarm by the night watchman on a barque lying at the same wharf, remarked, "Don't be in a hurry, it is not well started yet." Efforts are now being made to identify this man.
