Streets on His Way to the Railroad Station.

LONDON, Aug. 14-Escerted by the Life Guards to the railway station, King Edward and Queen Alexandra drove in semi-state Adeline Gilks, 1 dozen preserve dishes. this afternoon, leaving London for Cowes, Isle of Wight. The streets were thickly crowded with cheering people.
