London Feb. 18—Eight hundred thousand miners have already handed in their notices to quit work March 1, and the newspapers and the public are calling insistently for government interference. But the government is reluctant to force itself upon the disputants, and both sides seem to resent the idea of interference. A meeting of the executive committee of the International Miners Federation will be held privately in London on Wednesday to determine upon what action shall be taken. In the same way the miners' federation awaits the views of the transport workers federation, whose council will meet at Manchester Friday to consider the crisis.
