

PROVINCIAL HAPPENINGS

No one should fail to see "The Way of a Mother" at the Happy Hour Friday and Saturday.

While attempting to catch on a team Friday afternoon, Emilie Pelletier, of Harper street, Moncton, fell beneath the horse's feet, the result being that the animal kicked the boy in the head, inflicting injuries from which he died in the city hospital at six o'clock Sunday morning.

The new Crown Timber Lands Act for New Brunswick went into effect on Friday along with the new scales of stumpage fees and other changes in the regulations governing the Crown Timber lands of the Province. At the Crown Land Department the staff had an unusually busy time, this being the date on which the payments for bonuses, stumpage and mileage renewals are due. Upwards of \$50,000 was received at the department on Thursday.

The large box factory of the Sable Lumber Co., at Wilkins Siding, eighteen miles west of Liverpool, N. S., was destroyed by fire Friday afternoon and 200,000 feet of lumber in the factory was also burnt. The fire broke out at 1 o'clock from some unknown cause, over the boiler room and spread so rapidly that it was impossible to save anything. Efforts were made to prevent the flames from spreading over the barrens, that were dry as tinder, but failed, the flames reaching the houses some distance away and reducing eight of them to ruins. The occupants saved some of their effects.

"Seven Hours in New York" is said to be the last word in musical comedy. The plot, and a clever one by the way, relates the adventures of a party making the most of seven hours in New York, from 3 p. m. until 4 a. m. There is said to be more fun and lively entertainment crowded into the play than in half a dozen ordinary shows. The songs and dances are all that experiences and good judgment in staging and costuming can devise. John Anderson of Dalhousie, N. S., was killed by the stumbling of his horse a few miles from his home while on his way there from Bridgetown. After transacting the business which brought him to Bridgetown, he left for his home some fifteen miles distant about seven o'clock on Saturday evening. One of his neighbors returning from Annapolis between ten and eleven o'clock observed his horse cast on the roadside, and next saw Mr. Anderson lying a few feet from the wagon, dead, evidently striking on his head as he was thrown from his wagon. Mr. Anderson was largely engaged in lumbering business owning a large quantity of timber land which he converted into lumber with his own mill. He leaves a wife and one son, a daughter, who resided with him. The deceased was sixty years of age.

Blair's Lake, near Amherst, was the scene of a drowning on Sunday. The victim, Frank Sweeney, a young man, swam around for a short time when suddenly he sank from sight. He arose to the surface a few seconds later, and then went down like a log. A young man named Logan was in the water at the time, but could not render any assistance, as the water was too deep, and he could not swim. Grappling irons were soon secured and after dragging in the vicinity for about three quarters of an hour the body was brought to the surface. Doctors who had been summoned shortly after the man went down worked over the body for some time but all to no avail. Dr. Rawboldt afterwards said that the man died from heart failure, and was probably dead when he came to the surface the second time. The deceased was a nephew of Hon. Frank Sweeney of Moncton, and of P. G. Mahoney, M. L. A., for Westmoreland. He belonged to Melrose, N. B.

Fire broke out at about 2:30 yesterday morning in a store owned and occupied by Charles McKenzie on Bridge street, Sackville. The building, of which the ground floor was a meat shop, was made of wood and the flames made rapid progress, though the night was wet. The fire brigade was soon on the spot and got the flames under control, not, however, before the building had been completely gutted. The damage is estimated at about \$1,000. The cause of the fire is not known.

On Sunday afternoon, a valuable horse of Roland Carter, of Mount Whatley, near Sackville, while out in the yard for exercise, narrowly escaped drowning in a well. The horse let out for exercise as above stated was crossing over a platform covering an old well, but the planks were too aged to stand the weight of the animal and it went through and down the well into the water. The neighbors were given the alarm and were soon on the spot to render assistance in extricating the animal from its precarious position, but before the animal was taken out an hour had elapsed and the horse was quite badly chilled. The animal's condition is serious and if it dies it means a loss of about three hundred dollars to Mr. Carter.

C. W. McDougall, chief dairy inspector, who has been chosen to take charge of the campaign for the introduction of alfalfa growing in New Brunswick, was in St. John and after a conference with H. G. Sears, who is advocating the adoption of the legume in this province after seeing it successfully tried out in the West, it was announced that a really serious effort would be made to organize an alfalfa order. This is an organization to be formed under the direction of the provincial department of agriculture, and will include representatives of the boards of trade, farmers and dairymen's associations, agricultural societies, seed and agricultural implement firms and it is expected, will be a considerable factor in fostering the growth of alfalfa. While it will be too late for farmers to begin the raising of alfalfa this year, it is expected that almost immediate action is to be taken as a great deal of useful work can be accomplished in the way of publicity and instruction before next year's seeding.

The wholesale grocers of St. John have found it necessary to take steps to protect themselves against the discrimination against the residents of that section on the part of the L. C. R.

At a meeting of the grocers recently the schedule of rates on the Government road was discussed and it was pointed out that the increases are entirely on the local tariff which applies to all goods shipped from St. John or other points on the railway and that there have been no corresponding increases in the through rates, which apply to goods originating on another line and reaching their destination over the L. C. R. Shippers from Ontario for instance, which whom the local merchants are in "direct" competition, thus escape the increased freight rates and are given a great advantage over local merchants in their own territory.

KILLED BY PART OF FALLING DERRICK

James Price Working at Foot of Chimney Stack has Head Crushed to Pieces

Yesterday James Price, aged about twenty-five an Englewood, was instantly killed in St. John, while employed in construction work about the new C.P.R. elevator being erected by the J. S. Metcalfe Co., Ltd. The accident happened just a few minutes before the noon whistle would have blown to give him and his fellow workmen respite for the mid-day meal. Needless to say it caused deep regret amongst those with whom he had been working.

Price had been at work at the base of the chimney, at a concrete bed. Before any intelligent intimation of what had happened could be given, part of the derrick employed in hoisting material to the top of the chimney about 100 feet in the air became loosened and, breaking from its fastenings shot swiftly downward through space and, striking the unfortunate man on the head, crushed him to death. His head was fearfully jammed, and death was of course, instantaneous.

PASTOR HONORED BY DOAKTOWN FRIENDS

To the electors of the Town of New-castle.
I, the undersigned, John Clark, for several years your representative at the Council Board, found myself, a short time ago, compelled, in justice to you the electors of the Town, to resign my position as Alderman, not that I wished to shirk the responsibility of serving you, but that the majority of the Board wished to impose upon the Town what I considered an unnecessary tax. After several years serving as an Alderman of the Council, acting especially in the finance department, as well as in the electric light and water department, I could not bring myself to sanction the movement made by the council to keep the electric plant running by day. This from careful investigation, I found would cost the Town considerably over \$1000 immediate outlay, and approximately \$2000 per year to keep it in operation, and the revenue for that increased expenditure would only amount to about \$300 per year.

I felt it my duty after carefully considering the matter to resign my position as Alderman, not to avoid the duties imposed upon me as such, but to place this question in the hands of the voters of the Town, feeling as I do, that if the rate-payers of the Town endorse my view on the subject, the Council will not saddle them with this additional burden on their already too heavy taxes.

CAMPBELLTON MAN BACK FROM THE WEST

William Currie, Ex. M. P. P., Didn't Find Things Out There so Rosy as had Been Painted

A Campbellton despatch says.—Mr. William Currie, who formerly represented Restigouche county in the Provincial Legislature, has returned there and has taken up his residence.

It will be remembered that Mr. Currie left New Brunswick soon after the old Provincial Government went out of office and removed to the West declaring this province had gone to the dogs politically and otherwise, but he did not resign his seat in the Legislature. Now Mr. Currie is back here again, apparently convinced that there are worse places than New Brunswick.

WOLVES AND BUFFALO

Investigations carried on by the Forestry Branch of the Dominion Government have proven conclusively that several large herds of wild buffalo are still to be found in the hilly country on the northern boundary of Alberta, in the neighbourhood of the Slave River. A party working under the direction of Mr. A. J. Bell, the Government Agent at Fort Smith, made a study of the habits and obtained photographs of these buffalo, which are identical in appearance with the former buffalo of the plains, the remains of which were forced to seek shelter in the timbered fastnesses of the north.

These wood-buffalo when fully grown are able to defend themselves against their natural enemies, but in the winter before the young yearlings have attained full strength, they frequently fall victims to the timber-wolves. Bands of these wolves hover around the flanks of the buffalo herds as they pass in single file from one feeding ground to another, waiting for the opportunity to cut off a young animal and drive it from the beaten trail into the deep snow, where it is unable either to escape or to defend itself.

Partly eaten carcasses were found by the investigating party which clearly indicated that the wolves were the cause. These grey timber-wolves are of large size and are very numerous in this region where they menace the existence, not only of the wood-buffalo, but of other game as well. The Dominion Government already offers a bounty of twenty dollars apiece for their destruction, but so sparsely inhabited is the region and so clever are the wolves in avoiding traps, that the present bounty has had little effect in reducing their numbers. It is possible that the Dominion Government will raise the bounty here to forty dollars in the hope of ridding the regions of these pests, and of preventing the extinction of the last wild bison in existence.
