He will belong to the band of young Bishope, being but fifty three years of age. Mgr. Bonnefoy leaves the See of Rochelle to fill the archiepiscopal one of Aix, left vacant by the death of Mgr. Gouthe-Soulard. He is known to Parisians by having labored there as priest from 1868 to 1892. Mgr. Bouquet, the new Bishop of Mende, will be a prelate with a history. The scene of this history was laid in Paris. He was born here and graduated at the Sorbonne. He was vicar of the Church of Saint Vinent de Paul when the Franco-German war broke out. As army chaplain during the war he was taken prisoner at the battle of Champigny and confined at Lagny and afterwards at Versailles.
