RETIRED SCHOOL TRUSTEES.—The retiring trustees this week, Messrs. Crabb, Swanton, Buchanan and D. Ferguson, have all signified their intention of presenting themselves for re-election. These four gentlemen have been for a long time connected with our educational interests, and will, we believe, obtain re-election at the hands of the ratepayers. We have not as yet heard of an opposition which can be so called.

SCARCITY OF CARS.—A Detroit despatch says:—The Grand Truck Company recently refused 2,000 carloads of freight at this point for lack of cars. Superintendent Lamour, of the western section, is harassed by urgent demands for "more cars," and there is every reason to believe the line will be doubled and additional cars built at an early date. Barley dealers in Ontario have lost heavily by the inability of the road to transport promptly.

QUALIFICATION OF CANDIDATES.—As there is a good deal of talk about this one and that one being properly qualified to fill municipal offices, we have clipped the following from the Toronto Evening Telegram, on this question, and send them to our candidates should study it up. Citizens who contemplate running for municipal offices would do well to look into the Municipal Act passed at the last session of the Local Legislature, so that they may make themselves sure as regards their qualification. Sec. 265 of the Municipal Act where a property qualification is required, provides that the person is to make and subscribe to a solemn declaration, the conclusion of which states: "And that such estate at the time of my election was of the value of at least (specifying the value) over and above all charges, liens and incumbrances affecting the same." Mr. Dalton in Practice Court reports, page 549, April 15, 1875; in Kay, Ex. Rol. Bole vs. McLean, held: Notwithstanding the use of the word "estate" in the declaration of a candidate under the Consolidated Municipal Act 1873, that he is nevertheless qualified if the rating of the value on the roll is sufficient in amount. No change has been made in the law that incumbrances are not to be considered in ascertaining the amount of qualification. Sec. 3, Chap. 24, of the Statutes of Ontario, amended sec. 70 of the Municipal Act additional to the words "to at least the value following" in the twelfth line thereof, the words "over and above all charges, liens and incumbrances affecting the same." So that all intending candidates for municipal honors, whether as mayors, reeves, deputy reeves, aldermen or councillors, must look well after their title deeds, and see that they are not embarrassed with too many liens, incumbrances and similar encumbrances, or if they are, to see that they are assessed at sufficient value to set off these attachments.

LEGAL NOTES.

What Has Transpired During the Week.

COUNTY COURT AND GENERAL SESSIONS.—The County Court and General Sessions were opened on Monday last at 10 o'clock pursuant to adjournment. The usual cases of Parsons v. Yager and Denbow v. the Ontario Bank, not being ready the County Court was adjourned to the 30th at 10 o'clock. The sittings of the General Sessions will be continued for some days, for the purpose of selecting jurors, the selectors being the Judge, Junior Judge, Sheriff, Warden and Treasurer.

BENCH WARRANT RESULT.—A bench warrant was issued for the arrest of Thos. Rolp of Gorrie, against whom a true bill was found on Wednesday last. He was appointed Constable at Fordwich by the County Judge, at the request of the magistrates of the place.

Some Not-West Grievances.

In the House of Commons on Monday, Mr. Cameron (Huron) asked for a return showing the name and nationality of each of the agricultural instructors in the Indians in the North-west, with the various particulars in relation to the same; and also a return showing the name and nationality of the Government land guides in the North-west. In speaking of this, Mr. Cameron cited a couple of instances that came under his own observation in the North-west, wherein immigrants were put to great inconvenience and taken out of their way by the ignorance of the guides, and made the subjects of petty extortions. The sale of Sir John Macdonald agreed to the motion, and promised to investigate the cases of extortion, which, he stated, were entirely without the authority of the Government.

The receipts of revenue on account of the Dominion Consolidated Fund from July 1 to November 30, 1880, amount to \$12,028,369 for the same period last year \$8,965,816. The total expenditure for the same period, 1880, was \$9,114,679, and for 1879, \$9,242,690.

The great timber case of McLaren v. Caldwell has been decided, so far as the Court of Chancery is concerned, in favor of the plaintiff, Vice-Chancellor Proudfoot holding that he was bound by the decision of the Court of Common Pleas in the case of Boale v. Dickson. The case will be taken to the Court of Appeal, no injunction issuing before February.

A rising has occurred in Aahantee, as the result of a dispute between the colonial governor and the native king. Fortunately two British gunboats appeared on the scene just as things began to look critical. The rebellion was suppressed and the native king arrested and sentenced to sixteen years imprisonment.

CHRISTMAS STOCK SHOW.

Fat Beef, Pork and Poultry to the Fore.

Although there were some fine exhibits at the Christmas Show, held under the auspices of the West Huron Agricultural Society on Friday last, yet the whole thing seemed to fall flat. There were ninety entries, and many of them would have done credit to any show, but the want of enthusiasm, and the lack of support given by those persons in whose interest the show is principally got up, led against its success. The place of exhibition is one unsuited for the display of dressed meat, poultry, etc., and the bare rafters above and the chilling ice beneath were enough to send coldness to the heart of even a butcher's apprentice. What we need in Goderich on such an occasion is a good central place, the market house for instance, which can be temporarily fitted up for such a purpose at a small cost, and a little more encouragement from the public and men of business in town. The drill shed is too large and uninviting at this season for such a purpose. The live stock shown was hardly up to the mark as a whole, but there was some fine pork and a little more exhibited. The turkeys and geese were particularly good, and were neatly dressed by the exhibitors. There is a feeling abroad that the show as now carried on is not in the best interests of the Society, and that unless a little more encouragement is given it will have to fall through.
