Declaration in the Edmonton Federal Constituency Took Place Yesterday Afternoon, Hon. Frank Oliver has Majority of 2,217 Votes Over His Opponents.

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PIGRIMS DINED NORTHCLIFFE.

Famous English Publisher Speaks at Banquet in New York.

New York, Nov. 11.—Lord Northcliffe, the famous English newspaper publisher, who until his elevation by King Edward was Alfred Harmsworth, was the guest of honor last night at the banquet of the Pilgrims of the United States at Delmonico's. The toast of "President Roosevelt and King Edward" having been pledged, Mr. Harmsworth introduced Colonel Harvey, who made the welcoming address to Lord Northcliffe. The British journalist and publisher responded as follows:

"The object of the Pilgrims is the promotion of the sentiment of brotherhood among the nations and especially the cultivation of an unwritten friendship between the inhabitants of the United States and of the British Empire. Those relations, which have undergone a great many family rifts in the last three hundred years, have to the best of my knowledge rarely been so pleasant as at this time."

"There have been times when from the point of view of John Bull we have had to fight a little happier if instead of the Pilgrims landing on Plymouth Rock, Plymouth Rock had landed on the Pilgrims."

"These have been times also, as on the occasion when the ladies of the United States fitted out a hospital ship for the help of our soldiers in the South African war, when we have realized that after all there is something in the statement that blood is thicker than water. I do not remember that any other people ever fitted out an hospital ship for us, though there was a good deal of talk of fitting out ships of another description."

Lord Northcliffe then remarked that he had not forgotten the obliteration of the idea of ultra-faction between the United States and Great Britain from his mind. He stated that he had selected his own individual Americans to scrap," adding that he had compared weights with George Harmsworth, the highest individual American to scrap."

The speaker then referred in a more serious vein to the journalistic profession and the work it was doing "for the world's peace."

FELL ON GAS JET IN FAINT.

Accident Which May Prove Fatal to Toronto Woman—Toronto News.

Toronto, Nov. 11.—Mrs. George Cook, while lighting a gas jet, was seized with a faintness. She fell on the gas jet and her clothing ignited. She was badly burned and fell to the floor unconscious. The accident happened at about 11 p.m., but she was not discovered until 7 p.m., when her husband returned from work. She will probably die.

Suffered From Asthma.

John Beatty, aged 58, suffering from asthma for a long time, suicided today at his home, by cutting his throat with a razor.

To Throw Open Gullies' Limit.

Sir James Whitney denies the report current in Halifax that the Ontario government has completed a survey of a large portion of the famous Gullies timber limit and will throw it open to the public for staking at a fixed date. The report says parties with an inside tip already in Cobalt and Havelburg and have stakes and trenches made.

Cochrane Township Sale.

Ontario Railway has decided to open the sale of lots in Cochrane township on November 25.

The Frank Law Trial.

Frank Law, mining broker, charged with illegal flotation of Cobalt mines, will come up for trial at the December sitting of the general sessions. His bail of \$10,000 was renewed today.

Acquitted of Manslaughter.

Woodstock, Nov. 9.—After an hour's deliberation the jury acquitted Chester Buckborough, charged with manslaughter. It was alleged he set fire to the Queens hotel, Tillsonburg, resulting in three deaths.

Another Shooting Accident.

Guelph, November 8.—Geo. Felker, a young man, was killed near his home at Fergus while out hunting. His shot gun accidentally discharged while climbing a fence. He was shot in the head and died in a few minutes.
