She is now at the dry dock pier where repairs will be effected. Mr. Tasker Cook is her agent and he is looking after her supplies. The LaProvence reports fish plentiful on the Banks and the French and Newfoundland vessels are doing good work. The LaProvence has several thousand lbs. of green fish on board.
