FRIDAY, March 24, 1916. Mr. Lloyd asked for an answer to his question as to when the Bay de Verde Branch Rrailway was to be opened.

The Colonial Secretary replied that the Reid Company were anxious to have the line open as soon as possible and that the delay was caused by an accumulation of ice on the track. He stated that it entirely depended on weather conditions as to when a start would be made and that if the present state of weather continued the line line would be opened April 15th.

The Bills: "An Act to amend 3 George V., Cap. 14, entitled: 'An Act Respecting the Construction of a Railway through Labrador'"; "An . Act o amend the War Measures Act, 1914": "An Act to Incorporate the Salvation Army" and "An Act to enable the Governor in Council, during the existence of a State of War, to take possession of articles of Commerce unreasonably withheld" passed their third reading and were ordered to be sent to the Legislative Council for concurrence.

The Bill: "An Act to amend the Law respecting the Naturalization of Aliens" passed committee stage, without amendment. The Bill: "An Act to Regulate the Prosecution of the Sealfishery" was introduced by the Prime Minister, put through all stages and sent to the Upper House for concurrence. The Bill says that when the 12th day of March falls on Sunday the dates before which it was unlawful to sail shall be read as if the same were expressed to be the 11th 12th and 13th day of March, respectively. When the 12th of March falls on Sunday any Customs Officer may clear ships the day before. This Act shall be held to have been in force as before March 11th, 1916.
