The Octopus Cure.

Sea-Dwellers Who Grow New Limbs. If our soldiers only knew the secret of the octopus and other sea creatures, there would be no need of military hospitals, bandages, splints or disinfectants. Moreover, the Germans would find it necessary to kill them outright, or they would make the unpleasant discovery that our Army could not be diminished, except temporarily, and the wounded men would return to the scene of activities as strong as ever after a few weeks.

For the octopus has the knowledge of how to grow new limbs, and in his subterranean den he frequently does so.

As might be supposed, few sea-dwellers care to tackle the octopus, but there are some which do. Sharks, dog-fish and whales find him quite a savoury meal. But he is not a nice customer to play with. He has some underhand German tricks which rather nonplus his opponents.

The great one is his ink-bag. When an enemy is about to attack, he squirts his ink (through a sort of fountain-pen filler) into the water. The effort shoots him backwards, and his foe, confused by the black cloud and the altered position of the octopus, is often unable to spot this wily creature before he sinks away into obscurity.

If he comes to grips with a dog-fish, the battle is hot and furious, and it is the octopus that suffers. He may be gobbled up or he comes out of the fray with a limb, or sometimes two limbs, missing; and then the wonderful magic of the sea begins.

The octopus retires to his home—generally a dark cave under a shelving rock, with a front garden decorated with bones and shells, the reminiscences of many a good dinner—and goes on the sick list.

What happens then is only conjecture; but it is certain that in that dreary spot alone, uncared for, and with only a solution of sea-water to disinfect his wounds, the octopus gradually, stealthily, grows a couple of new limbs.

Other fighters of the sea are able to repair themselves in the same way as the octopus. These terribly bloodless creatures, the crabs, treat themselves in a like manner, as do also the lobsters.

If they have a claw injured in a fight they go so far as to deliberately nip it off themselves to give the new one a chance to grow unimpeded, which it does without delay.—Pearson's Weekly.
