#### DRURY SAYS CAN. HOCKEY MEN FINE.

PITTSBURG, Pa., Feb. 25.—Reports from Chamboux, France, following the

defeat of the American Olympic hockey team by Canada's sextette, stating that Uncle Sam's skaters were indignant over the treatment accorded them by the Canadians, and that the referee had overlooked a lot of off-side plays which resulted in goals for the Maple Leaf wearers, were all bunk, according to Herb Drury, local ace, who was a member of the American outfit. Drury denies that he and his mates were the victims of unsportsmanlike tactics or questionable decisions. He admits that his team was beaten fairly and squarely, and that the goals were made legitimately. He also denies the report that the Canadians coached the teams of other foreign countries in their games against the Americans. "We were beaten by a better team," was the way Herb explained the Canadian victory. "We have no alibi to offer, although had Cohen and one or two others, who were eligible accompanied us, we might have put up a closer fight at least. We had a comparatively easy time winning our other games in the elimination process, but when we took the ice against the Canadians, we faced a superior outfit, one who had a roster of players who were the cream of Canada. Their spars were as

good as our regulars, while we were sadly handicapped in that department." Drury paid a high tribute to the officials in charge of the Winter Olympic Sports. He said he had a wonderful time during his stay in the French Alps, and that there was nothing lacking in the way of accommodation and entertainment. Drury and Taffey Abel, of the St. Paul's team, departed ahead of the other members of the sextette. W. S. Hadcock, President of the United States Hockey Association, who was in charge of the team, and the rest of his squad, are now on the ocean, and will arrive in New York this week.
