The Hundred and Fifty Miners in Korea Killed by Explosion

Premier King May Announce Dissolution of Parliament To-Day--Blacksod Bay Considered as Terminus for Canadian-English Line--Cholera Outbreak in Yokohama.

MINERS KILLED IN KOREA.
TOKIO, Sept. 4. One hundred and fifty persons were killed in an explosion at Teihako Coal mine in Korea. Dispatches to the Nippo are to-day.

CHOLERA IN YOKOHAMA.
TOKIO, Sept. 4. Cholera cases have been reported in Yokohama, and the authorities are vaccinating thousands of mobilizing reserves in a campaign against the malady.

ISLAND WORKING TOWARD PROSPERITY.
QUEBEC, Sept. 4. The British Free State is getting steadily on its feet and the population is doing its best to bring about a state of prosperity such as has not existed here for many years, said Sir James Granton Edmond, Irish Free State Senator, who arrived here this morning on the Montreal.

SYMPATHY EXPRESSED.
WASHINGTON, Sept. 4. The State Department and Navy officials received condolences from the British Government and people and the British Air Ministry on the death of the late Lord Curzon, who died on the 20th of August.

ANNOUNCEMENT EXPECTED TO-DAY.
OTTAWA, Sept. 4. Mr. W. L. Mackenzie King, Prime Minister of Canada, left to-night for his constituency, in North York, Ont., to commence a speaking tour, and is expected in his first speech to-morrow afternoon to make a definite announcement as to the dissolution of Parliament. The forecast is that an election will be held the last week in October.

THE SHENANDOAH DISASTER.
CADDWELL, Ohio, Sept. 4. Air rushing into holes torn in the Shenandoah by the twisting of the radio and control cabins, caused the bucking of the ship and the breaking up into two major parts, is the opinion of the naval board of enquiry that visited the wreckage to-day.

CANADA'S FINANCES.
OTTAWA, Sept. 4. Decreased net debt, increased ordinary revenue, and decreased expenditure during five months of the present fiscal year, ending August 31, are shown in the Department of Finance statement issued to-day. The net debt now stands at \$2,366,923,000.

SURRENDERS NICARAGUAN PORT.
MANAGUA, Sept. 4. General Alfredo Rivas agreed to surrender to the Government the strategic fortress of La Loma, overlooking the Capital, which he has held since the recent raid in protest against the inclusion of Liberals in the Nicaraguan Cabinet.

IRISH-CANADIAN S.S. LINE.
DUBLIN, Sept. 4. The formation of a company to establish a new trans-Atlantic shipping line with Blacksod Bay, County Mayo, and a Canadian port as the terminus, was authorized at a meeting here to-day, under the chairmanship of an unnamed American. Brigadier-General Sir Edward Bellingham will be the President.

TERMINALS AT PORTLAND FOR SALE.
PORTLAND, Me., Sept. 4. The Canadian National Railways have made an offer to the state port officials of Maine to sell the Grand Trunk terminal facilities here, and the offer has been taken under consideration. The terms are not made known, but the offer was definitely made by S. J. Hungerford, Vice-President. The value of the property is said to be in the vicinity of \$3,000,000.

DECLARED LOST.
ROME, Sept. 4. The submarine Sebastiano, missing since the recent manoeuvres of the Italian Navy, off Sicily, has been officially declared lost.

THE LEIF ERICKSSON.
WASHINGTON, Sept. 4. Further indication that the Leif Erickson expedition of 1924 had sailed from its last port, was contained in a radio message from Donald B. MacMillan, received yesterday. The party was headed by Wm. Spring, who sailed from Norway in the spring of last year with three companions in a forty foot boat to follow the Viking trail to the United States by way of Tealand and Greenland. The message said MacMillan discovered, at Holstensbor, Greenland, a man who entertained Nutting at Julianehab.

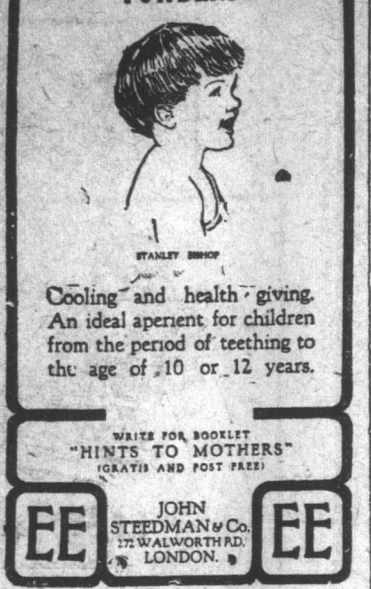
READY FOR THE CONFLICT.
PEZ, Sept. 4. Franco-Spanish naval forces, in preparation for a big offensive against the rebellious Moors, have begun an intensified bombardment of the coast in the neighborhood of Adjuir Bay, Alhucemas. The French, now under the supreme command of Marshal Fretin, are ready to go forward when the word is given. The Rifians also are prepared.

STEAMER FOUNDERED.
HOBART, Tasmania, Sept. 4. A wireless from the British steamer Kanna, reports the Karamu, of the Union Steamship Co., New Zealand, has foundered. Fifteen of the crew were saved and eleven are missing.

The Papuan Sorcerer's Revenge

The witch-doctor or sorcerer is still one of the principal characters among the natives of Papua or New Guinea, and he still exercises considerable influence on his fellow savages. Richard Humphries, a British magistrate, was ordered to enquire into a vendetta between the people of two native villages in the interior. Accompanying him on his journey were three other white men, Harry Dowling, a photographer, and Martin Moore Taylor, who tell the story in the Wide World magazine. Suddenly Maimura leaped over something in the path between the high grass that rose on every side of us and yelled. I did not know the meaning of the word he shrieked over and over again, but behind a bend in the trail, we found the other policeman standing beside a bed of hot coals. On the fire was a deep earthenware pot, and beside it a piece of wood and a stone—evidently the cover of the pot and the weight which held it down. In the dust about the fire were the prints of naked feet. To one side a peg had been driven into the ground, and fastened to it was another length of the same kind of plant vine which had been tied to the snake. It was all very mysterious to me.

"Look inside the pot," said Humphries, although he had not done so himself. With the stick I carried I turned the hot vessel over and fished inside it. I brought to light a khaki-colored handkerchief, unmistakably one of those which had disappeared two nights before when the old sorcerer had hung up our clothing to dry.
