The Duke of Edinburgh's Allowance. LONDON, July 31.—In the House of Commons, to-day, the Bill granting an annuity of £25,000 to the Duke of Edin-

Commons, to-day, the Bill granting an annuity of £25,000 to the Duke of Edithburgh, upon his approaching marriage with the Princess Marie Alexandrowina, came up on its second reading.

Mr. P. A. Taylon, member for Leicester, moved that the second reading of the Bill be postponed for one month from this date. He protested against the frequent applications by the Crown for grants of annuities to the Royal children. He thought that if the civil list was sufficient for the proper maintenance of the Royal household, the Crown ought to surrender to the public treasury the immense private property now held by it. He stated that the whole management of the civil list raturally gives rise to numerous grave suspicions on the part of the public by reason of the secrecy with which it is invested.

The present allowance of the Duke of Edinburgh was an ample one.

Mr. George Anderson, member for Ghasgow, seconded the motion and some discussion ensued.

Mr. Gladdyner regetted the tone of the discussion susted.

Mr. Gladforns regretted the tone of the discussion. He denied that the Government had maintained any secreey touching the management of the Crown property. The civil list, he said, was never intended to provide for the portioning of royal children. Parliament must either adopt the course at present proposed, and as pursued with regard to those of the royal children already married, or provided for an increased civil list. He upheld the proposition contained in the Bill, as it gave to Parliament the control of the conduct of the Caown and Royal family.
